LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY December 6, 2019

CALL TO ORDER

President Jackson called the December 6, 2019 meeting of the 129th Legislative Council to order at 10:27 a.m. in the Legislative Council Chamber.

President Jackson convened the meeting at 10:27 a.m. with a quorum of members present.

President Jackson, Speaker Gideon and Representative Dillingham recognized Heather Carey, Legislative Council secretary, on her last day for her many years of service to the Legislature.

Legislative Council Chair Jackson asked if there was any objection to taking items out of order. There was no objection. The Chair then moved to New Business.

NEW BUSINESS

Item #5: Procedures for Deciding Appeals of Legislative Bill Requests and Consideration of Appeals of Bill Requests for the Second Regular Session.

Ms. Gresser reviewed the procedures for the review of Legislative Bill Requests and the proposed protocol for deciding those requests.

Motion: That the Legislative Council approves the proposed protocol for deciding Appeals of Legislative Bill Requests. Motion by Senator Timberlake. Second by Speaker Gideon. **Motion passed unanimously (10-0-0-0)**.

The Legislative Council proceeded to consider and vote on seventy-seven (77) appealed bill requests in accordance with the adopted protocol, and using an electronic voting system. The Legislative Council authorized twenty-one (21) bills for introduction in the Second Regular Session, tabled 8 (8) bill requests and declined to authorize forty-five (45) bill requests. Three (3) bill requests were withdrawn by the sponsor prior to the Legislative Council's vote. The Legislative Council's action on the bill requests is attached.

OLD BUSINESS

Item #2: Consideration of Tabled Bill Requests from the October 23 Legislative Council meeting

The Legislative Council took no action on Tabled Bill Requests.

NEW BUSINESS

Item #1: Legislative Council Meeting Schedule for 2020

Ms. Gresser reviewed the request from the Committee To Study the Feasibility of Creating Basic Income Security for the Legislative Council to approve outside funds that were raised with Legislative Council authorization.

Motion: That the Legislative Council authorizes the Committee To Study the Feasibility of Creating Basic Income Security to accept additional outside funding in the amount of \$250 that was raised in accordance with the authorization of the Legislative Council. Motion by Representative Moonen. Second by Representative Dillingham. **Motion passed** (7-2-0-1, with Senator Timberlake and Representative Stewart opposed, and Representative Fecteau absent).

Item #3: Acceptance of the Annual Report of the Loring Development Authority of Maine

The Loring Development Authority of Maine submitted its annual report for acceptance by the Legislative Council.

Motion: That the Legislative Council accepts the Annual Report of the Loring Development Authority of Maine and will place it on file. Motion by Senator Timberlake. Second by Representative Stewart. **Motion passed unanimously (10-0-0)**.

REPORTS FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND COUNCIL OFFICES

Executive Director's Report

Grant Pennoyer, Executive Director, submitted the following report, presented by Ms. Gresser.

1. Aspiring Leaders – Third Cohort

The third cohort of staff recently completed the Aspiring Leaders program that was first offered in 2016. This very successful program was designed in-house to encourage and engage promising staff. This year's graduates who made the additional commitment to participate in the program are: Ariel Ricci and Jennifer Henderson from the Office of Program Evaluation and Government Accountability; Suzanne Voynik from the Office of Fiscal and Program Review; Olivia Watson from the House Democratic Office; Nadia Stovicek and Sarah Ward from the Senate Democratic Office; Janet Stocco and Dan Tartakoff from the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis; Roy Lopez from the Office of Legislative Information Technology; Mark Swanson, Adam Bachelder and Rachel Carter from the Office of the Revisor of Statutes; and Frank Gleason from the Office of the Clerk of the House.

2. Harassment Prevention Training Update

In November, 127 staff and 25 supervisors completed annual harassment prevention training. Additional staff training is planned for January. Lobbyists will begin annual training in mid-December and Legislators will receive training in January.

3. Legislator Training Workshops

Three training workshops are being offered to Legislators on December 17 and 18 in partnership with the Council of State Governments. The topics include: *Building a Culture of Excellence and Civility; Managing Multiple Responsibilities;* and *Strategies to Overcome Impasse to Build Agreement.* Space is limited for these workshops so advance registration is strongly encouraged.

Fiscal Report

Chris Nolan, Director of the Office of Fiscal and Program Review, presented the following report.

1. General Fund Revenue Update (see attached)

General Fund revenue was over budget by 0.2 million (0.1%) for the month of October and by 31.7 million (2.3%) for the fiscal year to date.

Individual income tax revenue was under budget by \$0.5 million for the month but over budget by \$15.9 million for the fiscal year to date. Estimated individual income tax payments were over budget for the month by \$2.5 million while individual income tax withholdings were over budget by \$1.9 million. Refunds were under budget (more refunded than budgeted) for the month by \$3.5 million. Corporate income tax revenue was under budget by \$0.2 million for the month but over budget by \$1.8 million for the fiscal year to date. Sales and use tax revenue (September sales) was over budget for the month by \$4.3 million and by \$14.3 million for the fiscal year to date. Other taxes and fees were under budget for the month by \$5.0 million due to a correction in the distribution of real estate transfer taxes between the General Fund and the Housing Opportunities for Maine (HOME) fund.

2. Highway Fund Revenue Update (see attached)

Highway Fund revenue was under budget by 3.3 million (11.2%) for the month of October but over budget by 2.4 million (2.0%) for the fiscal year to date.

Fuel taxes were under budget by \$4.0 million for the month and by \$0.6 million for the fiscal year to date. Motor vehicle registration and fees were over budget for the month by \$1.0 million and over budget for the fiscal year to date by \$3.0 million.

3. Cash Balances Update

The average balance in the cash pool for October was \$1,666.5 million, an increase from September's average of \$1,629.3 million and above both last October's average balance and the ten-year average for the month. The average Highway Fund balance of \$12.1 million in October was down from September's average of \$16.1 million.

4. Revenue Forecasting - Next Steps

The Revenue Forecasting Committee met on November 25, 2019 to review and update the revenue forecast to comply with its December 1, 2019 statutory reporting deadline. The report was posted to the RFC web site and printed copies will be available later this week. A summary follows:

General Fund revenue estimates were revised upward by \$52.7 million for FY20 and by \$21.9 million for FY21, for a combined increase of \$74.6 million for the 2020-2021 biennium. The resulting forecasted overall rate of growth for General Fund revenue for FY20 is now 2.8% over

FY19 final revenue amounts, followed by a 2.1% rate of growth for FY21. The forecast for the 2022-2023 biennium was revised upward by \$24.9 million for FY22 and by \$14.3 million for FY23 (an increase of \$39.2 million for the biennium). FY22 General Fund revenue is now projected to grow at an overall rate of 2.8% and for FY23 at a rate of 3.4%.

General Fund Summary - December 2019 Revenue Forecast

Highway Fund revenue estimates were revised upward by \$3.1 million for FY20 and by \$0.9 million for FY21 (\$4.0 million for the 2020-2021 biennium). The forecasts for FY22 and FY23 were revised upward by \$0.9 million per year (\$1.8 million for the 2022-2023 biennium).

Fund for a Healthy Maine (FHM) revenue estimates were revised slightly upward for FY 20 but slightly downward for FY21 through FY 23. There were no changes made to the forecast for Tobacco Settlement Payments after significant adjustments were made in the May 2019 forecast. Minor adjustments were made to Fund for a Healthy Maine revenue from the Hollywood Casino Bangor and from income from investments consistent with the larger changes in the forecasts for these revenue sources.

Medicaid/MaineCare Dedicated revenue estimates were revised downward by \$5.7 million for FY20 and by \$3.6 million per year for FY21 through FY23. A one-time reduction of \$2.1 million was made in the hospital tax as a result of two hospitals, in the midst of bankruptcy filings, that have not paid their hospital tax on a timely basis. In addition, while service provider tax revenue is up in the first 4 months of FY20, the increase in revenue is less than budgeted and therefore a decrease in the forecast of \$3.0 million per year was made consistent with actual expected revenue.

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$13.2 million (4.7%) for the month of November and by \$44.8 million (2.7%) for the fiscal year to date. These positive variances do not reflect the December 2019 revenue forecast, which increased budgeted General Fund revenue by \$52.7 million for FY 2020.

Individual income tax revenue was over budget by \$0.9 million for the month and by \$16.7 million for the fiscal year to date. Individual income tax withholdings were over budget by \$4.9 million while refunds were under budget (more refunded than budgeted) for the month by \$2.5 million. Corporate income tax revenue was over budget by \$1.1 million for the month and by \$2.9 million for the fiscal year to date. Sales and use tax revenue (October sales) was over budget for the month by \$4.5 million and by \$18.8 million for the fiscal year to date. The Revenue Forecasting Committee had access to preliminary November data in preparing the December 2019 revenue forecast.

Highway Fund revenue was over budget by \$2.3 million (7.1%) for the month of November and by \$4.7 million (3.1%) for the fiscal year to date. These positive variances do not reflect the December 2019 revenue forecast, which increased budgeted Highway Fund revenue by \$3.1 million for FY 2020.

Fuel taxes and motor vehicle registrations were both slightly under budget for the month. Other revenue was over budget for the month by \$2.4 million. Most of this variance was attributed to a transfer to the Highway Fund related to the municipal excise tax reimbursement program.

3. Cash Balances Update

The average balance in the cash pool for November was \$1,616.1 million, a decrease from October's average of \$1,666.5 million but above both last November's average balance and the ten-year average for the month. The average Highway Fund balance of \$0.9 million in November was down from October's average of \$12.1 million. This significantly reduced Highway Fund balance is the result of increased expenditures for construction season spending and delays in the availability of federal reimbursements.
