OLD BUSINESS

Item #1: Review of recent federal regulations affecting lobster industry

Speaker Fecteau invited the Commissioner of Marine Resources, Patrick Keliher, to provide an overview of the general details and status update of the federal regulations affecting the lobster industry. Commissioner Keliher proceeded to provide a status update of the federal regulations, summarized the work that the Department of Marine Resources has done over the past few years in developing its proposal to the federal government, mentioned the pending court cases regarding the protection of North Atlantic right whales, and described the potential impact of the federal regulations on the lobster industry in the State. In response to questions from Legislative Council members, Commissioner Keliher discussed, among other things, "ropeless" gear, the Department of Marine Resources' duty to manage the lobster fishery as a sustainable resource, the role of Department of Marine Resources in the pending court cases, and the timetable for briefings and conclusion of the pending court cases.

Motion: That, in accordance with 1 MRSA § 405, sub§ 6, the Legislative Council enter into an executive session for the purpose of discussing pending or contemplated litigation. Motion by Speaker Fecteau. Second by Rep. Talbot Ross. Motion passed unanimously (9-0-0-1, with Senator Vitelli absent).

The Legislative Council entered into an executive session at 12:30 p.m. At the conclusion of its executive session, the Legislative Council voted unanimously to ends its executive session at 1:41 p.m. and reconvene its regular meeting during which the following motion was made.

Motion: That, in accordance with the discussion in executive session, the Executive Director seek to engage the services of independent legal counsel to file on behalf of the Legislative Council an amicus brief in the lawsuit, *IAMAW Maine Lobstering Union-Local 207 v. Raimondo*, filed in federal district court; if the Executive Director is unable in a timely fashion to engage the services of independent counsel, the Executive Director is authorized to explore engaging the services of counsel for the plaintiffs for purposes of filing the amicus brief. Motion by Representative Dillingham. Second by Rep. Talbot Ross. **Motion passed unanimously (8-0-0-2**, with Senator Vitelli and Senator Pouliot absent).

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$51.1 million (10.9%) for the month of September and over budget by \$129.0 million (11.1%) for the fiscal year to date.

Sales and use tax revenue for September (August sales) was over budget by \$15.6 million (8.7%) for the month and by \$69.7 million (13.2%) for the fiscal year to date. Individual income tax revenue was over budget by \$21.3 million (10.0%) for the month and by \$28.3 million (5.5%) for the fiscal year to date, with positive variances in individual income tax withholding and estimated payments partially offset by income tax refunds exceeding budgeted amounts (negative impact on revenue). Corporate income tax revenue was over budget by \$18.6 million for the month and by \$35.3 million for the fiscal year to date, largely the result of positive variances in corporate income tax estimated payments.

Highway Fund revenue was over budget by \$2.9 million (11.7%) for the month of September and over budget by \$4.5 million (5.1%) for the fiscal year to date.

Fuel taxes were over budget by \$2.2 million for the month and by \$2.5 million (4.2%) for the fiscal year to date. Motor vehicle registration and fees were over budget by \$0.7 million for the month and by \$1.4 million (5.7%) for the fiscal year to date.

3. Cash Balances Update

The average balance in the cash pool for September was \$3,758.8 million, a decrease from August's average of \$3,774.8 million. The decrease was largely the result of decreases in Other Special Revenue Funds balances (i.e., Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) balances and American Rescue Plan (ARP), Local Fiscal Recovery Fund balances) partially offset by increases in General Fund and Independent Agency Funds balances. The average Highway Fund balance in September was \$52.4 million, a decrease from August's average of \$59.0 million, reflecting normal construction season variances.

4. Economic and Revenue Forecast Meetings

The Consensus Economic Forecasting Commission (CEFC) is scheduled to meet on Friday, October 29th to review and update the economic forecast for the November 1st report. The Revenue Forecasting Committee (RFC) will then meet in late November to review and update the revenue forecast for the December 1st report.

<u>Procedures for Review of Legislative Bill Requests for the</u> <u>Second Regular Session of the 130th Legislature</u>

Requirements Relevant to Bills in the Second Regular Session

- 1. Under the terms of the Maine Constitution, Section 1 of Article IV, Part Third, Legislative Power, the business of the second regular session **must be limited to:** budgetary matters; legislation in the Governor's call; legislation of an emergency nature admitted by the Legislature; legislation referred to committees to study and report by the Legislature in the first regular session; and legislation presented to the Legislature by written petition of the electors (direct citizen initiative).
- 2. Under the Legislative Council's Rules of Procedure for the 130th Legislature, any action of the Legislative Council requires the affirmative vote of at least 6 members.
- 3. Under Rule 203 of the Joint Rules of the 130th Legislature, any vote of the Legislative Council to accept or reject a bill or resolve for introduction under the procedures established under the Joint Rules must be taken by the yeas and nays, and that vote must be recorded and made available for public inspection.
- 4. Under Rule 217 of the Joint Rules, a bill that has been introduced and finally rejected in a regular or special session may not be introduced in a subsequent session of the same Legislature except by a vote of 2/3 of both chambers. Therefore, determinations as to the relevancy of Rule 217 will be made by the presiding officers outside of this meeting.

Protocol for Deciding Legislative Bill Requests

- A. The Legislative Council will review bill requests alphabetically by policy area. An exception to this order of review may be made for bill requests for which an ASL Interpreter is required for persons who are deaf or hard of hearing. Those bills will be taken out of order at a time during the meeting when an interpreter is available.
- B. For procedural consistency, when voting on a bill request, the initial motion on a bill will be presumed to be a motion to accept the bill request for introduction into the second regular session along with a second to that motion. ("Yes" is to let in a bill; "no" is to reject the bill for introduction). Also for procedural consistency, unless otherwise stated, each motion is presumed to have been made by the vice-chair of the Legislative Council, seconded by the chair.
- C. In order to review all legislative requests in a timely manner, voting will be by electronic vote or a show of hands, with each Council Member's vote on each bill being recorded. The record of each vote will be made available by the Office of the Executive Director for public inspection following the meeting.

- D. If a bill request has been identified by the Revisor as requiring a ruling under Joint Rule 217, the Legislative Council may vote to accept that bill for introduction, conditional upon a subsequent ruling by the presiding officers.
- E. Legislative sponsors and others are welcome to observe the Council's deliberations on the bill requests, but discussion of the requests will be confined to members of the Legislative Council and its staff. Discussion of a bill request among Legislative Council Members will be limited to whether it is appropriate for introduction under Constitutional provisions for second regular session bills, and will not speak to the merits of the bill itself.
- F. If the Legislative Council turns down a bill request, the sponsoring Legislator may appeal that decision if an appeal is filed in a timely manner. At a subsequent meeting of the Legislative Council, the legislator may speak briefly to the bill request under appeal.
