1           **Emergency preamble. Whereas,** acts and resolves of the Legislature do not  
2 become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

3           **Whereas,** this legislation needs to take effect before the expiration of the 90-day  
4 period in order to provide for review of anticipated land-based aquaculture projects by the  
5 Department of Marine Resources as soon as possible; and

6           **Whereas,** in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within  
7 the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as  
8 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now,  
9 therefore,

10           **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

11           **Sec. 1. 7 MRSA §2, 4th ¶,** as amended by PL 2017, c. 94, §1, is further amended  
12 to read:

13           In addition, the commissioner shall be concerned with the quality of life of Maine  
14 farmers and rural communities. The commissioner shall promote: farm financing and  
15 rural development proposals; conservation and preservation of agricultural lands;  
16 increased and improved production of beef, poultry, sheep, dairy beef and other livestock;  
17 expanded and improved production of potatoes, fruits and other vegetables and  
18 horticultural ventures; coordinated foreign and domestic marketing of Maine agricultural  
19 products; in conjunction with the university, crop development and integrated pest  
20 management; ~~development of land-based aquaculture facilities;~~ and conservation of  
21 nonrenewable energy resources and utilization of renewable energy resources in  
22 conjunction with the Governor's Energy Office. To accomplish these objectives, the  
23 commissioner is authorized for, or on behalf of, Maine's farmers and rural community: to  
24 engage in research and educational programs; to participate directly or indirectly in  
25 programs to encourage and enable individuals to enter agricultural or other rural  
26 enterprises; to institute litigation or upon request to represent farmers or other members  
27 of the rural community in litigation where the commissioner determines that such  
28 litigation may be beneficial to agricultural industry as a whole; and to exercise all other  
29 powers of an agency of State Government. The commissioner may study such issues and,  
30 consistent with statute, take such actions either individually, for, or on behalf of, the  
31 State's farmers or rural residents, or jointly with such other persons, agencies or  
32 organizations as the commissioner determines may benefit the State's farmers and rural  
33 communities. To further accomplish these objectives, the commissioner is authorized  
34 beginning July 1, 1991, on behalf of the State's rural community, to administer food  
35 assistance programs including the receipt, distribution and administration of federal and  
36 state funds, including block grants, for food assistance.

37           **Sec. 2. 7 MRSA §52, sub-§3-A,** as amended by PL 2017, c. 94, §2, is further  
38 amended to read:

39           **3-A. Farm product.** "Farm product" means those plants and animals useful to  
40 humans and includes, but is not limited to, forages and sod crops, grains and food crops,  
41 dairy products, poultry and poultry products, bees, livestock and livestock products, ~~fish~~

1 and fish products and fruits, berries, vegetables, flowers, seeds, grasses, Christmas trees  
2 and other similar products.

3 **Sec. 3. 7 MRSA c. 209**, as amended, is repealed.

4 **Sec. 4. 12 MRSA §6073-D, last ¶**, as amended by PL 2017, c. 94, §4, is further  
5 amended to read:

6 This section does not exempt the possessor of the marine organism from any  
7 requirement to hold a lease or license pursuant to section 6072, 6072-A, 6072-B or  
8 6072-C or ~~Title 7, section 1504~~ 6085 to engage in the culture of marine organisms.

9 **Sec. 5. 12 MRSA §6085**, as repealed by PL 2017, c. 94, §5, is reenacted to read:

10 **§6085. Marine organism aquaculture license**

11 **1. License required.** The commissioner may require a license for aquaculture of  
12 marine organisms in facilities that are not located in the coastal waters of the State but are  
13 located in the State.

14 **2. Licensed activities.** The holder of a license under this section may possess  
15 marine organisms the holder has raised by means of aquaculture. The holder of such a  
16 license is exempt from any requirement regarding the time of taking or possessing,  
17 minimum or maximum length or other minimum or maximum size requirement for any  
18 marine organism the holder has raised by means of aquaculture.

19 **3. Permit denial.** The commissioner may refuse to issue a license under this section  
20 if the commissioner finds that the aquaculture activity presents an unreasonable risk to  
21 indigenous marine life or its environment. In determining whether or not to refuse to  
22 issue a license, the commissioner shall consider factors, including, but not limited to:

23 A. Risk of accidental or intentional introduction of marine organisms or marine  
24 organism products into the coastal waters of the State;

25 B. Risk of the introduction or spread of disease within the State; and

26 C. Interference with the enforcement of possession, size or season limits for wild  
27 marine organisms.

28 **4. Monitoring and revocation.** The commissioner shall monitor licensed facilities  
29 under this section on an annual basis. If the commissioner determines following an  
30 annual review or at any other time that the licensed aquaculture activity presents an  
31 unreasonable risk to indigenous marine life or its environment, the commissioner may  
32 revoke the license after the licensee has been given an opportunity for a hearing before  
33 the department.

34 **5. Reporting.** The commissioner may require the holder of a license under this  
35 section to file periodic reports regarding the aquaculture practices and production of the  
36 facility. Information obtained pursuant to this provision is considered fisheries statistics  
37 for the purposes of section 6173, except that information about marine organism health  
38 reported pursuant to section 6071 may not be considered fisheries statistics.
