Recommendations on L.D. 353 – the Biennium Budget

Pursuant to Joint Rule 314, the ACF committee has reviewed the portions of LD 353, the Biennium Budget bill, relating to the committee's jurisdiction. Our votes are indicated on the worksheets provided by the Office of Fiscal and Program Review and attached to this memo. A simple check mark in the Committee Vote line indicates unanimous acceptance on an item. The word "OUT" means a unanimous recommendation to remove this item from LD 353. We are recommending that a few items be modified. All changes are indicated on the worksheets and described briefly in this memo.

### Department of Agriculture, Food, and Rural Resources

The committee is unanimous in its recommendations for the Department of Agriculture, Food, and Rural Resources. We accept the provisions in LD 353 with very few modifications. These proposed modifications are presented below. Where there are companion items within the department initiatives, the page and reference #'s for the related item is in parentheses in the table and noted on the work sheets.

## **Department of Conservation**

The ACF members are unanimous in recommending that certain positions proposed for elimination in LD 353 be retained. ACF is unanimous in recommending that proposed funding cuts resulting in fewer meetings of the Land Use Regulation Commission and less travel for field staff be rejected.

The table below presents the unanimous recommendations of the committee. At the end of this memo you will find 3 reports that provide detail on the resulting budget gap. Each report addresses this gap differently.

### Comments on funding for the Land Use Regulation Commission

The members on each report want to emphasize the importance of maintaining LURC at a capacity that allows planning efforts to proceed and allows permits to be processed in a timely manner. At current staffing levels no one can be taken off task without repercussions.

All permit fees and penalties collected by LURC are deposited in the General Fund. All fees collected for LURC services through the Unorganized Territory Municipal Cost Component are deposited in the General Fund as well as all assessments on Towns and Plantations that use LURC's services. LURC is funded from the General Fund, but the GF Municipal Cost Component reflects a percentage of the overall UT valuation. As property valuations within LURC jurisdiction (both the UT and the organized Towns & Plantations) rise, revenue to the General Fund increases. Increased revenue to the GF from the UT and Towns & Plantations in FY2009-2010 is \$164,807. Out of that \$104,994 has not already been accounted for in the budget and is an actual increase in revenue. The amount for FY 2010-2011 is likely to be slightly greater depending on any increase in valuation. All 3 ACF Reports propose using this additional revenue to offset the cost of restoring positions in the amendment to LD 353.

The differences in the 3 reports are the proposals to address the "remaining gap." The differences are explained with a few bullets and an accompanying table for each report.

- Increased revenue to the General Fund associated with LURC fees and assessments are likely to equal or exceed the gap in DOC's budget for the biennium.
- In January of 2010, the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry and the Joint Standing Committee on Taxation will jointly receive a report on funding and other financial matters pertaining to the commission. This annual report provision was enacted by PL 2007, c. 541, An Act to Implement the Recommendations of the Commission to Study the Costs of Providing Certain Services in the Unorganized Territories. Sec.B-4 of that Act enacted 12 MRSA §685-G. (yellow attachment to this report)
- At the beginning of the Second Regular Session and half-way through the first fiscal year of the biennium, the committees can cooperatively examine budget needs, see how closely revenue is matching projections, and make statutory changes, if necessary, to provide adequate resources for the commission.

### Report C – Sen. Bryant and Rep. Pratt

- Report C recommends increasing the percent valuation for the Unorganized Territory and for Towns and Plantations receiving LURC services. An increase of .001% in UT valuation (from .013% to .014%) would increase GF revenue by \$34,855. An increase of .01% valuation for towns and plantations (from .015% to .025%) would yield an additional \$171,995.
- These increases would bring percent valuations to the levels recommended in the 2006 report of the Commission to Study the Costs of Providing Certain Services in the Unorganized Territories.
- Attached is a draft of the necessary statutory changes to implement this recommendation. (blue)

# Report C

## **Proposed Amendment**

Sec. X 12 MRSA §685-G sub-§1 is amended to read:

## §685-G. Funding

1. Unorganized territories. Beginning with fiscal year 2009-10, funding for services and activities of the commission for planning, permitting and ensuring compliance in the unorganized territories must be assessed and allocated to the unorganized territories through a fee equal to .013% .014% of the most recent equalized state valuation established by the State Tax Assessor. This fee must be collected through the municipal cost component under Title 36, chapter 115.

# Sec. Y. 12 MRSA §685-G, sub-§2 is amended to read:

2. Towns and plantations. Beginning with fiscal year 2009-10, a town or a plantation in the commission's jurisdiction that elects not to administer land use controls at the local level but receives commission services or a town or plantation with a portion of its land under the commission's jurisdiction and receiving commission services, including planning, permitting and ensuring compliance, must be assessed a fee equal to .015% .025% of the most recent equalized state valuation established by the State Tax Assessor for that town or plantation or that portion of a town or plantation under the commission's jurisdiction. The State Tax Assessor shall issue a warrant to each such town or plantation no later than March 1st of each year. The warrant is payable on demand. Interest charges on unpaid fees begin on June 30th of each year and are compounded monthly at the interest rate for unpaid property tax as established by the State Tax Assessor for the unorganized territory. For any assessment that remains unpaid as of September 1st of the year in which it is due, state revenue sharing to that town or plantation must be reduced by an amount equal to any unpaid warrant amount plus any accrued interest, until the amount is paid. These fees must be deposited to the General Fund.

### SUMMARY

Sec. X increases the fee assessed for LURC's services in the Unorganized Territory to .014% of valuation. Sec. Y increases the fee assessed in towns and plantations under LURC jurisdiction to .025% of valuation.
