LD 9 An Act to Establish Processing Time Limits for Permit by Rule Applications Under the Site Location of Development Laws

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 45 exempts permit by rule applications under the site location of development laws from the 20-day processing requirement under current law and instead requires the Commissioner of Environmental Protection to decide whether such an application meets applicable permit by rule requirements within 90 calendar days of notifying the applicant that the application has been accepted unless the commissioner establishes a different time period for the decision pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, section 344-B.

LD 10 An Act to Amend the Laws Governing Invasive Aquatic Plants

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 5 includes in the definition for certain conservation and environmental protection laws of "invasive aquatic plant" all Myriophyllum species that are nonindigenous to the State, as well as all Trapa species, all Cabomba species and the plants water soldier, giant salvinia, swollen bladderwort and starry stonewort. Sales of invasive aquatic plants are prohibited in the State under current law. Public Law 2023, chapter 5 also prohibits the sale in the State of any plant of the genus Myriophyllum that is indigenous to the State.

LD 27 An Act to Align Maine's Lead Abatement Law with Federal Definitions and to Clarify Lead Abatement Licensing and Certification Requirements

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 28 changes the definition of "residential dwelling" in the laws governing lead abatement. It also removes the exemption that provides that a person 18 years of age or older who owns and personally occupies a dwelling unit in which a resident child has been identified as lead-poisoned need not obtain licensing and certification to perform abatement activities within that dwelling unit, as long as the person completes any training required by the Department of Health and Human Services.

LD 28 An Act to Streamline Rulemaking for Revisions to Screening Levels for the Solid Waste Beneficial Use Program

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 57 provides that the Board of Environmental Protection may adopt or amend rules relating to the beneficial use of solid waste. Those rules are designated major

substantive rules except for certain rules adopting or amending screening levels for beneficial use, which are designated routine technical rules.

LD 71 Resolve, Regarding Legislative Review of Chapter 171: Control of Petroleum Storage Facilities, a Major Substantive Rule of the Department of Environmental Protection

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Resolve 2023, chapter 10 authorizes the Department of Environmental Protection to finally adopt Chapter 171: Control of Petroleum Storage Facilities, a provisionally adopted major substantive rule of the department that was submitted to the Legislature for review pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

Resolve 2023, chapter 10 was finally passed as an emergency measure effective May 8, 2023.

LD 74 An Act to Update the Responsibilities of the Clean-up and Response Fund Review Board

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 61 shifts responsibility for appeals of certain insurance claims-related decisions from the Clean-up and Response Fund Review Board to the Board of Environmental Protection. It also provides procedures for vacancies on the board, sets term limits for board members, reduces the number of required meetings and directs the board to choose a chair every 2 years.

LD 134 An Act to Increase the Handling Fee for Beverage Containers Reimbursed to Dealers and Redemption Centers

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 48 amends the beverage container redemption laws to increase the amount of the reimbursement of beverage container handling costs paid by an initiator of deposit to a dealer or redemption center from $4 \ 1/2\phi$ per container to $5 \ 1/2\phi$ per container beginning May 1, 2023 and to 6ϕ per container beginning September 1, 2023.

Public Law 2023, chapter 48 was enacted as an emergency measure effective May 5, 2023.

LD 164 An Act Regarding the Funding of Lake Water Quality Restoration and Protection Projects

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 426 incorporates a number of changes and clarifications to the Lake Restoration and Protection Fund under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, section 480-N, including changing the name of the fund to the Lake Water Quality Restoration and Protection Fund, clarifying the types of projects that are eligible for 100% payment of eligible costs under the fund, clarifying the scope of fund expenditures not related to those projects and providing that the fund may receive money from any source, public or private. It also provides one-time funding of \$200,000 in fiscal year 2024-25 for projects that meet specific criteria and improve or maintain the quality of lake waters in the State.

LD 216 An Act to Amend the Laws Governing Storm Water Management to Provide an Exemption for Trails for Hiking and Other Similar Activities

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 8 exempts from the storm water control requirements under the pollution control laws subject to the jurisdiction of the Board of Environmental Protection trails intended, constructed and managed for use by persons walking, snowshoeing, skiing or hiking.

LD 217 An Act to Support Manufacturers Whose Products Contain Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 138 extends the January 1, 2023 deadline for reporting the use of perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS, in products for sale to January 1, 2025 and authorizes reporting the amount of total organic fluorine if the amount of each PFAS compound is not known and allows the amount of PFAS to be reported based on information provided by a supplier rather than testing. It clarifies the packaging exemption under the law regulating PFAS in products, exempts from PFAS reporting requirements manufacturers that employ 25 or fewer people, clarifies that the requirements and prohibitions of the law do not apply to used products or used product components and makes other technical clarifications to PFAS reporting requirements under the law. These changes to the law regulating PFAS in products are made retroactive to January 1, 2023.

LD 219 An Act Regarding Appeals of License or Permit Decisions of the Commissioner of Environmental Protection

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 139 provides for the following changes to the laws governing orders and decisions of the Commissioner of Environmental Protection and the Board of Environmental Protection and appeals of those orders and decisions.

- 1. Current law provides that the commissioner may revoke or suspend a license if the commissioner finds that certain specified statutory criteria have been met. The board is similarly authorized by law to modify a license or order necessary corrective action if the board finds that the same statutory criteria have been met. Public Law 2023, chapter 139 provides that such a revocation or suspension of a license by the commissioner or such a modification of a license or ordering of corrective action by the board may occur at any time, including during the pendency of a judicial appeal of a final decision regarding the license. It also provides that the commissioner may act on an application for a license or permit renewal, amendment, revision, condition compliance, surrender or transfer at any time, including during the pendency of a judicial appeal of a final decision regarding the license or permit.
- 2. Public Law 2023, chapter 139 provides that, on appeal to the board of a final license or permit decision of the commissioner, an appellant must include any proposed supplemental evidence with the filing of the appeal and the board may admit into the record supplemental evidence offered by a respondent in response as well as additional evidence and analysis submitted by Department of Environmental Protection staff in response.
- 3. Public Law 2023, chapter 139 provides that when a license or permit decision or other final action of the board or the commissioner is appealed to a court, the board or the commissioner may toll for the pendency of the judicial appeal the running of time for any deadline established in the license, permit or action under appeal.

LD 276 An Act to Assist Municipalities in Preventing Damage from Storm Water

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 65 authorizes a municipality or a regional community and economic development organization to appropriate funds to repair a private road, way, bridge or storm water management system for the purpose of protecting or restoring a protected natural resource by preventing storm water runoff pollution from reaching the protected natural resource subject to certain specific requirements, including a requirement that the private road, way, bridge or storm water management system is located wholly or partially within or immediately adjacent to a military installation closed pursuant to the federal Defense Base Realignment and Closure Act of 1990.

LD 319 An Act to Amend Maine's Underground Oil Storage Tank Laws

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Under current law, upon the expiration date of a manufacturer's warranty for certain underground oil storage tanks, the tank and its associated piping must be removed from service and properly abandoned, except that a double-walled underground oil storage tank may continue in service up to 10 years beyond the expiration of the warranty if certain testing is conducted to verify the integrity of the tank. Public Law 2023, chapter 16 removes the 10-year limitation, thereby allowing such double-walled tanks to continue in service indefinitely as long as the same testing requirements are satisfied.

LD 392 Resolve, Regarding Legislative Review of Portions of Chapter 305: Natural Resources Protection Act - Permit by Rule, a Major Substantive Rule of the Department of Environmental Protection

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Resolve 2023, chapter 8 authorizes the Department of Environmental Protection to finally adopt portions of Chapter 305: Natural Resources Protection Act - Permit by Rule, a provisionally adopted major substantive rule of the department that was submitted to the Legislature for review pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

LD 400 Resolve, Directing the Department of Environmental Protection to Examine Regulatory Requirements for Outdoor Wood Boilers

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Resolve 2023, chapter 13 directs the Department of Environmental Protection to review the laws and rules governing outdoor wood boilers and rules adopted by the department relating to emission standards, stack height requirements and setback requirements for new installations of outdoor wood boilers to determine if stack height and setback requirements for new installations should be amended, taking into consideration the emission standards of the most recent models of outdoor wood boilers. It directs the department to submit a report regarding the review to the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and Natural Resources, which may submit a bill relating to the report to the Second Regular Session of the 131st Legislature.

LD 466 Resolve, to Evaluate Options for the Recycling of Solar Panels and Wind Turbine Blades

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Resolve 2023, chapter 52 directs the Department of Environmental Protection to evaluate whether solar panels and wind turbine blades meet the criteria in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, section 1772, subsection 2 to be a candidate for a product stewardship program. The evaluation must include collection of information regarding facilities operating or planned for operation in the eastern United States that can recycle solar panels or wind turbine blades and identification of the recycling costs for those materials for customers of those facilities. The department is directed to include its findings and recommendations from the evaluation, including any proposed legislation, in the annual report required by Title 38, section 1772, subsection 1 and due February 15, 2024.

LD 478 An Act to Improve Coastal Sand Dune Restoration Projects

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 97 amends the Natural Resources Protection Act to provide that the Department of Environmental Protection is allowed to authorize through a permit or a permit by rule a coastal sand dune system restoration project that uses allowable stabilization materials for the planting of native dune vegetation as long as the project meets certain statutory requirements and satisfies all other applicable requirements for the permit or permit by rule. "Allowable stabilization materials" is defined to mean natural, plant-based biodegradable or compostable fabrics, erosion control blankets, logs or rolls made from coir, jute, straw, polylactic acid polymers or other similar materials, including such materials that contain or use gravel or cobble, discarded holiday trees, other trees fallen or washed up in proximity to the site and stakes or anchors used to secure any of these materials. The use or placement of such materials within a coastal sand dune system in accordance with an authorized permit or permit by rule is not considered a permanent structure under the Natural Resources Protection Act.

LD 508 Resolve, Directing the Department of Environmental Protection to Review Regulation of Waste Discharge from Finfish Aquaculture Facilities

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Resolve 2023, chapter 59 directs the Department of Environmental Protection to conduct a review of applicable state laws and rules regulating the licensing of waste discharge from proposed finfish aquaculture facilities, including any waste discharge modeling requirements or standards, and of prior and current waste discharge monitoring requirements imposed on licensed finfish aquaculture facilities since 2004, including identification of any monitoring requirements imposed on those facilities that were subsequently removed and the basis for the removal. It also directs the department to develop recommendations for the establishment of minimum criteria or standards

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for waste discharge modeling required as part of a license application for a finfish aquaculture facility, which must be based on the department's knowledge of current best management practices for those facilities.

On or before January 15, 2024, the department is required to submit to the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and Natural Resources a report summarizing the review and providing any recommendations, including any proposed legislation, resulting from the review. After reviewing the report, the committee may report out legislation relating to the report to the Second Regular Session of the 131st Legislature.

LD 596 An Act to Exempt Certain Conservation Lots from Municipal Subdivision Review

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 79 amends the definition of "subdivision" under the laws governing subdivisions to provide that, unless the intent of a transferor is to avoid the objectives of those laws, the division of a tract or parcel of land accomplished by the transfer of any interest in the land to a holder does not create a lot or lots for the purposes of that definition if:

- 1. The transferred interest, as expressed by conservation easement, binding agreement, declaration of trust or otherwise, is to be permanently held for one or more of the following conservation purposes: retaining or protecting the natural, scenic or open space values of the land; ensuring the availability of the land for agricultural, forest, recreational or open space use; protecting natural resources; or maintaining or enhancing air quality or water quality; and
- 2. The transferred interest is not subsequently further divided or transferred except to another holder.

For the purposes of Public Law 2023, chapter 79, a "holder" means a governmental body empowered to hold an interest in real property under the laws of the State or the United States or a nonprofit corporation or charitable trust, the purposes or powers of which include retaining or protecting the natural, scenic or open space values of real property; ensuring the availability of real property for agricultural, forest, recreational or open space use; protecting natural resources; or maintaining or enhancing air or water quality or preserving the historical, architectural, archaeological or cultural aspects of real property.

LD 718 An Act to Facilitate the Management of Wastewater Treatment Plant Sludge at the State-owned Juniper Ridge Landfill

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 283 amends the law regarding the reuse or recycling of construction and demolition debris by certain solid waste processing facilities that were in operation during calendar year 2018 and accept exclusively construction and demolition debris by extending the dates by

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which such facilities must reuse or recycle a certain percentage of such debris through methods other than placement in a solid waste landfill. The law makes those changes in effective dates retroactive to December 31, 2021.

Public Law 2023, chapter 283 also provides that, for the period beginning on the effective date of the Act and ending July 1, 2025, if in any 12-month period the total weight of the residue generated by a solid waste processing facility and disposed of or otherwise placed in a solid waste landfill exceeds the total weight of the solid waste initially generated within the State that was processed by the facility in that 12-month period, such excess residue, not to exceed 25,000 tons in that 12-month period, is deemed to be waste generated within the State within the meaning of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, section 1303-C, subsection 40-A as long as that excess residue is composed of oversized bulky waste and is disposed of or otherwise placed in a state-owned solid waste landfill. Any other excess residue generated by the facility in that 12-month period is deemed not to be waste generated within the State.

Public Law 2023, chapter 283 also directs the Department of Environmental Protection, in consultation with the Public Utilities Commission, to evaluate options for and develop recommendations regarding state regulation of the transportation, landfill disposal and other management of sludge generated from wastewater treatment plants as the activities of a public utility and regarding state regulation of the operation of state-owned solid waste landfills as a public utility. On or before January 15, 2024, the department is required to submit a report outlining the results of the study and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and Natural Resources. After reviewing the report, the committee may report out legislation relating to the report to the Second Regular Session of the 131st Legislature.

Public Law 2023, chapter 283 was enacted as an emergency measure effective June 23, 2023.

LD 826 An Act to Provide for the Management of the Waste Components of a Solar Energy Development upon Decommissioning

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 300 amends the laws regulating the decommissioning of solar energy developments to stipulate that decommissioning includes providing for the recycling of the waste components of the solar energy development that are recyclable, including, but not limited to, the solar panels, by a facility authorized to accept such materials for recycling and providing for the disposal of the waste components of the solar energy development that are not recyclable by a facility authorized to accept such materials for disposal.

LD 1172 An Act to Reestablish Annual Reporting on Solid Waste in Maine

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 331 requires the Department of Environmental Protection, beginning in 2026, to annually instead of biennially report to the Legislature information on statewide generation of solid waste, statewide recycling rates and available disposal capacity for solid waste. It also clarifies the categories of information required to be included in the report and requires the department to take all actions necessary to modernize, streamline and improve the efficiency of the data collection, consolidation and reporting systems, procedures and processes it uses or intends to use to satisfy that reporting requirement.

LD 1246 An Act to Include Endangered and Threatened Species Habitat in the Definition of "Significant Wildlife Habitat" Under the Natural Resources Protection Act

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 156 amends the Natural Resources Protection Act by adding to the definition of "significant wildlife habitat" habitat for state endangered and state threatened species that is within another protected natural resource area or that is wholly or partly contained within the boundaries of a proposed project site that requires approval from the Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to the Natural Resources Protection Act, the site location of development laws or the laws on performance standards for quarries or for excavations for borrow, clay, topsoil or silt or that requires approval from the Maine Land Use Planning Commission pursuant to the Natural Resources Protection and nonresidential uses only, the commission's use regulation laws.

Public Law 2023, chapter 156 also requires the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to adopt major substantive rules defining habitat for state endangered and state threatened species and the Department of Environmental Protection to adopt major substantive rules regarding the criteria used to determine whether an area is habitat for state endangered or state threatened species.

LD 1363 An Act to Support Extraction of Common Minerals by Amending the Maine Metallic Mineral Mining Act

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 398 amends the definition of "metallic mineral" in the Maine Metallic Mineral Mining Act and amends the definition of "mining" to exclude under specific circumstances the physical extraction, crushing, grinding, sorting, storage or heating of calcium carbonate or limestone to produce cement and the exploration for or physical extraction, crushing, grinding, sorting and storage of borrow, topsoil, clay or silt and gemstones, aggregate, dimension stone or other construction materials from a quarry. It also provides that a person engaging in

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mining activities pursuant to the Maine Metallic Mineral Mining Act is subject to the mining excise tax under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 36, chapter 371.

Public Law 2023, chapter 398 also establishes a mechanism by which a person proposing to conduct exploration for or physical extraction, crushing, grinding, sorting or storage of metallic minerals may request a written determination from the Department of Environmental Protection that the requirements of the Maine Metallic Mineral Mining Act do not apply to the activity. The department is directed to adopt major substantive rules governing such determinations, which must require, for such exclusion, that the activity will generate only mine waste that does not have the potential to create acid rock drainage, alkali rock drainage or drainage or other discharges that could cause violations of water quality criteria or standards other than sedimentation or turbidity and will not release or expose radioactive or other materials that could endanger human health or the environment. The rules must also require that the activity, if excluded from the requirements of the Maine Metallic Mineral Mining Act, is subject to requirements of Title 38, chapter 3, subchapter 1, article 6, article 7 or article 8-A or Title 12, chapter 206-A, as applicable, and the law provides that such activities are subject to the mining excise tax under Title 36, chapter 371.

LD 1411 An Act to Enhance Reporting by Certain Agencies Regarding Greenhouse Gas Emissions

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 234 requires that, on or before February 15, 2024, and annually thereafter, the Department of Transportation submit a report to the joint standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over environment and natural resources matters and transportation matters regarding capital work plan investments designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions associated with the department during the prior calendar year, including a summary of department-related greenhouse gas emissions associated with different sources and department-related greenhouse gas emissions associated with new road alignment construction activities during the prior calendar year.

Public Law 2023, chapter 234 requires the Maine Climate Council to include in its updated climate action plan, beginning with the updated climate action plan due by December 1, 2024, greenhouse gas emissions reductions projections, including sector-specific greenhouse gas emissions reductions projections, based on the strategies and actions in the plan and information regarding how those projections and the updated plan are designed to achieve the greenhouse gas emissions reductions specified in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, section 576-A.

Public Law 2023, chapter 234 amends the requirements for the Department of Environmental Protection's biennial report on the progress made toward meeting the greenhouse gas emissions reductions specified in Title 38, section 576-A and progress toward implementing the climate action plan to include an evaluation of gross annual greenhouse gas emissions, including an identification of greenhouse gas emissions by source category, energy emissions and consumption and an economic analysis of greenhouse gas emissions per unit of economic activity; an evaluation of net annual greenhouse gas emissions, including the State's carbon budget, forest carbon markets

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and a time series analysis of net greenhouse gas emissions; and an evaluation of sector-specific progress made toward meeting those reductions.

LD 1473 An Act to Protect Certain Unfiltered Drinking Water Sources

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 264 provides that lots or portions of lots that are within the watershed of a water source that is located in the City of Lewiston or the City of Auburn and that is used to provide drinking water by a water utility that has received a waiver from filtration pursuant to federal regulations are exempt from certain restrictions related to affordable housing density, the allowed number of dwelling units and accessory dwelling units.

Public Law 2023, chapter 264 also directs the drinking water program within the Department of Health and Human Services, Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention, in coordination with the Department of Environmental Protection, to evaluate state law and rules designed to protect the water quality of water sources and their related watersheds that are used to provide drinking water by a water utility that has received a waiver from filtration pursuant to 40 Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 141.70 to 141.76, as determined by the Department of Health and Human Services, and to identify any necessary changes to state law or rules or any other actions that can be implemented to strengthen the protections for those water sources and watersheds. On or before January 15, 2024, the program must submit to the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and Natural Resources a report summarizing its evaluation and providing any recommendations, including any proposed legislation, resulting from the evaluation, and the committee may report out related legislation.

LD 1652 Resolve, Regarding Legislative Review of Portions of Chapter 119: Motor Vehicle Fuel Volatility Requirements, a Late-filed Major Substantive Rule of the Department of Environmental Protection

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Resolve 2023, chapter 25 authorizes the Department of Environmental Protection to finally adopt portions of Chapter 119: Motor Vehicle Fuel Volatility Requirements, a provisionally adopted major substantive rule of the department that was submitted to the Legislature for review pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A outside the legislative rule acceptance period.

Resolve 2023, chapter 25 was finally passed as an emergency measure effective June 5, 2023.

LD 1814 An Act to Reduce Mercury in the Environment by Phasing Out Certain Fluorescent Light Bulbs

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 384 prohibits the sale or distribution of certain mercury-added lamps beginning January 1, 2026.

LD 1909 An Act to Modernize Maine's Beverage Container Redemption Law

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 482 makes multiple changes to the beverage container redemption laws, including the following.

- 1. It requires all initiators of deposit to enter into a commingling agreement no later than October 15, 2024 and authorizes the approval of special commingling agreements for initiators of deposit that are not members of a commingling group and that cannot in the aggregate satisfy the requirements for a qualified commingling agreement under current law.
- 2. It requires all established commingling groups by October 15, 2024 to establish a nonprofit commingling cooperative to provide for the management of beverage containers under a single commingling program. By January 15, 2025, the cooperative must submit a plan for the operation of the commingling program to the Department of Environmental Protection for review and approval, which the department must complete within 120 days of receipt. The plan must be designed to provide for implementation of the commingling program on or before July 15, 2025, which must be operated in a manner designed to achieve an overall statewide beverage container redemption rate of 75% by January 1, 2027, of 80% by January 1, 2032 and of 85% by January 1, 2037. Among its duties under the program, the commingling cooperative must account for and maintain unclaimed beverage container deposits. From those unclaimed deposits, the cooperative must pay to the department an annual fee not to exceed \$600,000 and must provide to the department \$1,000,000 annually to support the Cost and Carbon Efficient Technology Fund. Money in that fund is to be used to support grants relating to technology upgrades and activities designed to support the development of an infrastructure for the use of refillable beverage containers.
- 3. It implements a process, to be repealed December 31, 2025, through which a dealer or redemption center may apply for and the Department of Environmental Protection may approve a temporary waiver during which the dealer or redemption center may apportion beverage container costs to distributors using an alternative method that does not require processing of all beverage containers through a reverse vending machine or similar technology requiring the scanning of each container. The implementation of this process must be assessed in a February 15, 2025 report from the department to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over environment and natural resources matters.

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- 4. It requires the Department of Environmental Protection to adopt rules establishing requirements for the implementation by the cooperative of an efficient beverage container collection system of redemption centers that is adequate to serve the needs of consumers in both rural and urban areas throughout the State.
- 5. It specifies that, on or before February 15, 2024, and annually thereafter, the Department of Environmental Protection must report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over environment and natural resources matters on the status of the beverage container redemption program, including any recommendations for necessary amendments to the beverage container redemption laws. For the report due February 15, 2024, it requires the department to include recommendations for amendments to the laws necessary to ensure the timely and successful implementation of special commingling agreements and the single commingling program operated by a commingling cooperative.

LD 1926 An Act to Impose a Moratorium on New Point Source Waste Discharge Licenses on the Lower Presumpscot River

ENACTED LAW SUMMARY

Public Law 2023, chapter 295 amends the State's water classification program to provide that for the segment of the main stem of the Presumpscot River from Saccarappa Falls to tidewater, for the period beginning October 15, 2023 and ending January 1, 2028, there may be no new direct discharges to that segment except for any new direct storm water discharges licensed under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, section 413; Title 38, section 420-D; or Title 38, chapter 3, subchapter 1, article 6.
