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**LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL
MEETING SUMMARY
October 23, 2025**

CALL TO ORDER

Speaker Fecteau called the October 23, 2025 meeting of the 132nd Legislative Council to order at 9:04 a.m. in the Legislative Council Chamber.

Speaker Fecteau convened the meeting at 9:04 a.m. with a quorum of members present.

Speaker Fecteau announced his intention to take items out of order, and hearing no objection, moved to New Business, Item 1.

NEW BUSINESS

Item #1: Procedures for Deciding Legislative Bill Requests and Consideration of Bill Requests for the Second Regular Session

Director Gresser reviewed the procedures for the review of Legislative Bill Requests and the proposed protocol for deciding those requests.

Using the protocols, the Legislative Council proceeded to consider and vote on two hundred fifty eight (258) bill requests in accordance with the adopted protocol, and using an electronic voting system. The Legislative Council authorized eighty-two (82) bills for introduction in the Second Regular Session. The Legislative Council's action on the bill requests is attached.

Item #2: Proposed Document Service Fee Schedule for 132nd Legislature, Second Regular Session

Director Gresser presented the proposed Document Service fee schedule submitted by Clerk of the House, Robert Hunt, for the Second Regular Session. The fees remain the same as the First Regular Session.

Motion: That the Legislative Council approves proposed Document Service Fee Schedule for the 132nd Legislature Second Regular Session. Motion by Representative Gramlich. Second by Senator Pierce. **Motion passed unanimously (8-0-0-2**, with Representative Moonen and Representative Faulkingham absent).

Item #3: Legislative Council meeting schedule for 2026

Director Gresser reviewed the proposed meeting schedule for the Legislative Council for 2026, and suggested altering the November 2026 so as not to interfere with Thanksgiving and altering the December 2026 date, as it will follow the convening of a new Legislature.

Motion: That the Legislative Council approve the 2026 Legislative Council meeting schedule, with the . Motion by Senator Daughtry. Second by Representative Gramlich. **Motion passed unanimously (9-0-0-1**, with Representative Moonen absent).

Director Gresser responded that she is meeting with the Commissioner of Public Safety and members of the Capitol Police to discuss their plan to provide a similar level of security in the Cross Building with a minimum of disruption pending completion of the construction in Spring of 2026.

OLD BUSINESS

Item #1: Council Actions Taken by Ballot

Legislative Council Decisions:

Motion: That, upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee, and pursuant to its authority under 26 MRSA, §979-A, sub-§5, the Legislative Council of the 132nd Legislature ratify the collective bargaining agreement for the period ending September 30, 2027 that was negotiated and tentatively agreed to by the authorized representatives of the Legislative Council and the Maine Service Employees Association, Local 1989, SEIU (MSEA) on September 15, 2025.

Further, that the Legislative Council authorize the Executive Director to take all necessary steps to carry out the terms of this Agreement;

Further, upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee, that the Legislative Council exercise its right to adopt the revisions to its personnel policies, pending agreement from the respective authorities; to apply personnel policies and benefit provisions that are comparable to those contained in the aforementioned ratified collective bargaining agreement; and direct its Executive Director to incorporate as appropriate and administer those provisions; and

Further, that compensation provisions in the form of cost of living adjustments, lump sum payments, and salary steps comparable to that provided in the aforementioned collective bargaining agreement be provided to legislative employees who are not represented by MSEA, including to the members of the Independent Association of Nonpartisan Legislative Professionals contingent upon the IANLP's tentative agreement thereto, the effective dates of such compensation provisions to coincide with those contained in the aforementioned collective bargaining agreement.

Executive Director's Report November 20, 2025

1. Update on Cross Security Screening

As reported at the October 24, 2025 Legislative Council meeting, the timeline for opening the Cross Security Center has been delayed until Spring of 2026. To ensure there will be security in the Cross Building in time for the Legislature's Second Regular Session, the Commissioner of Public Safety and Capitol Police have developed a temporary security plan pending completion of the Cross Security Center. Under this plan, screening equipment will be set up on the first floor of the Cross Building at the North End (the end facing the parking garage), and the North End entrance will become the entrance that is open to the public. This temporary solution will be in place prior the convening of the Second Regular Session in January.

2. Update on Expansion of Access to Legislative Proceedings

At the June 24, 2025 Legislative Council meeting, the Council expressed interest in expanding access to legislative proceedings by increasing the number of platforms to which legislative proceedings are streamed. We researched several vendors that provide this type of re-streaming service and successfully tested using one of the services to stream several interim meetings to both the Legislature's website and YouTube. Beginning in January, all of the Legislature's committee meetings will be streamed simultaneously both to the Legislature's website and to YouTube.

General Fund revenue was above budget by \$28.4 million (6.7%) for October and \$103.0 million (5.4%) above budget for the fiscal year to date. General Fund revenue through October of 2025 was 1.8% above General Fund revenue through October of 2024 (FY 2025).

Individual income tax revenue for October was \$10.4 million (4.5%) above budget for the month and \$60.3 million (6.6%) above budget for the fiscal year to date. Individual income tax final and estimated payments accounted for \$15.2 million of October's positive variance and \$40.4 million of the positive variance for the fiscal year to date, while withholding payments were below budget by \$1.8 million for October but \$28.5 million above budget for the fiscal year to date. Individual income tax refunds were \$3.2 million greater than budgeted for October and \$11.9 million greater than budgeted for the fiscal year to date (negative impacts on the General Fund). Corporate income tax revenue was \$6.2 million (62.6%) above budget for October but \$0.4 million (-0.4%) below budget for the fiscal year to date. Sales and use tax revenue for October (September sales) was \$1.1 million (0.5%) above budget for the month and \$14.2 million (1.6%) above budget for the fiscal year to date. Estate tax revenue was above budget by \$4.4 million for October and above budget by \$14.1 million (100.5%) for the fiscal year to date.

Highway Fund revenue was above budget by \$5.7 million (7.1%) for October and \$15.2 million (6.8%) for the fiscal year to date. Highway Fund revenue through October of 2025 was 6.9% less than Highway Fund revenue through October of 2024, primarily because of the decrease in the automotive sales tax transferred to the Highway Fund in July of 2025.

Fuel taxes revenue was \$0.8 million (4.0%) below budget for October but \$1.8 million (2.2%) above budget for the fiscal year to date. Motor vehicle registration and fees were above budget by \$6.2 million (67.7%) for October and above budget by \$9.9 million (29.1%) for the fiscal year to date. Highway Fund transfers from the liquor operations fund were \$0.3 million less than budgeted for October but \$1.8 million (12.1%) above budget for the fiscal year to date.

3. Cash Balances Update

The average daily balance in the cash pool for October was \$3,549.6 million, a decrease of \$39.2 million from September's average daily balance. Decreases in the General Fund and Other Special Revenue Funds (Retaining Interest) were partially offset by increases in the Highway Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds (Interest to GF), Other State Funds and Independent Agency Funds. The Highway Fund average daily balance for October was \$109.1 million, an increase of \$15.8 million from September's average daily balance.

4. Economic and Revenue Forecast – Fall 2025 Meetings

The Consensus Economic Forecasting Commission (CEFC) met on October 30th to review and update the economic forecast and subsequently released its [November 1 report](#). The CEFC made relatively minor changes to its April 2025 forecast. Of particular note, the CEFC forecast for the growth in personal income was revised upward from 4.1% to 5.6% for calendar year 2025 but was unchanged for calendar years 2026 through 2029 and the forecast for growth in wage and salary income, the largest component of personal income, was revised upward from 4.0% to 4.8% for calendar year 2025 but was unchanged for calendar years 2026 through 2029. The CEFC also revised its forecast for the Consumer Price Index (CPI) downward from 3.2% to 2.8% for calendar year 2025 and made no changes to its wage and salary employment forecast.

The Revenue Forecasting Committee (RFC) is scheduled to meet on November 24th to review and update as necessary the revenue forecast for its required December 1st report.

Deciding Appeals of Legislative Bill Requests Turned Down By the Council

Requirements Relevant to Bills in the Second Regular Session

1. Under the terms of the Maine Constitution, Section 1 of Article IV, Part Third, Legislative Power, the business of the second regular session **must be limited** to budgetary matters; legislation in the Governor's call; legislation of an emergency nature admitted by the Legislature; legislation referred to committees to study and report by the Legislature in the first regular session; and legislation presented to the Legislature by written petition of the electors (direct citizen initiative).
2. Under the 132nd Legislative Council's Rules of Procedure, any action of the Council requires the affirmative vote of at least 6 members.
3. Under Rule 203 of the Joint Rules of the 132nd Legislature, any vote of the Legislative Council to accept or reject a bill or resolve for introduction under the procedures established under the Joint Rules must be taken by the yeas and nays, and that vote must be recorded and made available for public inspection.
4. Under Rule 217 of the Joint Rules, a bill that has been introduced and finally rejected in a regular or special session may not be introduced in a subsequent session of the same Legislature except by a vote of 2/3 of both chambers. Therefore, determinations as to the relevancy of Rule 217 will be made by the presiding officers outside of this meeting.

Suggested Protocol for Deciding Appeals

- A. The Legislative Council will review appeals in alphabetical order by Sponsor.
- B. For procedural consistency, when voting on an appeal of a bill request that was denied, the initial motion on a bill will be presumed to be a motion to accept the bill request for introduction in the second regular session along with a second to that motion. (A vote of "yes" is to let in the bill; a vote of "no" is to reject the bill for introduction). Also for procedural consistency, unless otherwise stated, each motion is presumed to have been made by the vice-chair of the Legislative Council, seconded by the chair.
- C. In order to review all legislative appeals in a timely manner, voting will be by electronic vote or a show of hands, with each Council Member's vote on each bill being recorded. The record of each vote will be posted on the Legislative Council's website as soon as practicable following the meeting.
- D. A Legislator who has filed a timely appeal of the decision of the Legislative Council to reject a bill request sponsored by that Legislator will be given a brief opportunity to orally present their appeal to the Council. A time limit of 2 minutes will be observed for Legislators making an appeal. Only by leave of the Chair of the Legislative Council may a person who is not the Legislator sponsoring the appealed request address the Council.
- E. Discussion of a bill request will be limited to whether it is appropriate for introduction under Constitutional provisions for second regular session bills, and will not speak to the merits of the bill itself. If a bill was turned down because it is closely related to another legislative request or to a carryover bill, the burden is on the Sponsor to convincingly distinguish the Sponsor's bill request from the closely related one.
