Re: Committee Recommendations on the Governor's Proposed Supplemental Budget Bill (LR 3206)

We are writing to provide the recommendations of the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government on those portions of the Governor's proposed Biennial Budget Bill (LD 1001) that are under the committee's jurisdiction. We have reviewed and discussed these initiatives and appreciate your consideration of our recommendations and comments.

INITIATIVES

The committee voted unanimously to move \underline{IN} all budget initiatives under the committee's jurisdiction with the **following exceptions**:

The committee voted, by a 6-2 vote, to move IN:

 Bureau of General Services, Capital Construction and Improvement Reserve Fund -Department of Administrative and Financial Services 0883

The committee voted, by a 7-3 vote, to move IN:

- Information Services Department of Administrative and Financial Services 0155; and
- Audit Bureau Auditor, Office of the State 0067 (General Fund allocation of \$9,600 in FY 2019-20 and \$0 in FY 2020-21)

The committee voted, by a 7-2 vote, to move IN:

Audit Bureau - Auditor, Office of the State 0067 (General Fund allocation of \$5,118 in FY 2019-20 and \$6,702 in FY 2020-21)

LANGUAGE PARTS

The committee voted unanimously to move IN all Language Parts under the committee's jurisdiction with the following exceptions and recommendations:

The committee voted 7-3 to move IN:

Part G

The committee recommends that Part S, Sec. S-4 be amended as indicated in the attached document. This amendment brings Part S language into alignment with the standard language for laws permitting criminal history record checks. This standard language was most recently enacted in 2 laws from the 1st Regular Session that permit criminal history record checks, LD 1340 and 1801.

The committee also notes that 5 MRSA §1982-A, sub-§5 in Part S requires a public records exception request be submitted to the Judiciary Committee pursuant to 1 MRSA §434.

Thank you for your consideration of our recommendations.

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The amendments to Part S, Sec. S-4 are highlighted in yellow.

5 MRSA §1982-A is enacted to read:

§1982-A, Criminal history record checks for current and prospective employees, contractors and contractor employees.

<u>1. Definitions.</u> As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

<u>A. "Federal Bureau of Investigation" means the United States Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation.</u>

B. "State Police" means the Department of Public Safety, Bureau of State Police.

2. Criminal history; information about criminal records and data obtained. The office shall obtain, in print or electronic format, criminal history record information containing a record of public criminal history record information as defined in Title 16, section 703, subsection 8 from the Maine Criminal Justice Information System created pursuant to Title 16, section 631, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation for any person employed by or who may be offered employment by the office, or who is employed by or may be offered employment by an office contractor or subcontractor in order to comply with the United States Internal Revenue Service's tax information security guidelines for federal, state and local agencies.

3. Fingerprint-based criminal history obtained. A person employed by the office or a person who is employed by an office contractor or subcontract shall consent to having the person's fingerprints taken. A person who may be offered employment by the office or by an office contractor or subcontractor shall consent to and have the person's fingerprints taken prior to being employed by the office. The State Police shall take or cause to be taken the fingerprints of a person who has consented under this subsection and shall forward the fingerprints to the Department of Public Safety so that the department may conduct a state and national criminal history record check on the person. The department shall forward the results obtained to the office. The fee charged to the office by the State Police must be consistent with the fee charged to executive branch agencies receiving similar services. Except for the portion of the payment that constitutes the processing fee charged by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, all money received by the State Police under this subsection must be paid to the Treasurer of State, who shall apply the money to the expenses of administration of this section by the department.

4. Updates to information. The fingerprint-based criminal history record check must be conducted at least once every 5 years as if the office determines that appropriate or as required under federal regulation. The office may request continuous notifications of updated criminal history record information if a service providing notifications of updated criminal history record information becomes available.

5. Confidentiality. Information obtained pursuant to this section is confidential and may not be disseminated for purposes other than as provided in subsection 6 and 7.

6. Use of information obtained. Criminal history record information obtained pursuant to this section may only be used by the office for employment purposes to screen an employee, a person who may be offered employment by the office, an employee of an office contractor or subcontractor or a person

who may be offered employment by an office contractor or subcontractor. The subject of any criminal history record check search under subsection 3 may contest any negative decision made by the office based upon the information received pursuant to the criminal history record check.

7. Person's access to information obtained. A person subject to a criminal history record check pursuant to subsection 3 must be notified each time a criminal history record check is performed on the person. A person subject to a criminal history record check under subsection 3 may inspect and review the criminal history record information pursuant to Title 16, section 709 and obtain federal information obtained pursuant to the criminal history record check by following the procedures outlined in 28 Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 16.32 and 16.33.

8. Right of subject to remove fingerprints from record. Upon request from a person subject to a criminal history record check pursuant to subsection 3, the Department of Public Safety shall remove the person's fingerprints from the department's records and provide written confirmation of the removal to the person.

<u>9. Refusal to consent.</u> The office or an office contractor or subcontractor may not employ or utilize a person who does not consent to the criminal history record check under this section in a position for which a criminal history record check is required pursuant to subsection 2.

Sec. S-1. 25 MRSA §1542-A, sub-§1, ¶U is enacted to read: U. Who is required to have a criminal history record check under Title 5, section 1982-A.

Sec. S-2. 25 MRSA §1542-A, sub-§3, ¶T, is enacted to read:

T. The State Police shall take or cause to be taken the fingerprints of the person named in subsection 1, paragraph U, at the request of that person or the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Office of Information Technology, and upon payment of the expenses as provided under Title 5, section 1982-A.

Sec. S-3. Sec. 6. 25 MRSA §1542-A, sub-§4, is further amended to read:

4. Duty to submit to State Bureau of Identification. It is the duty of the law enforcement agency taking the fingerprints as required by subsection 3, paragraphs A, B and G to transmit immediately to the State Bureau of Identification the criminal fingerprint record. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph C, D, E or F or pursuant to subsection 5 may not be submitted to the State Bureau of Identification unless an express request is made by the commanding officer of the State Bureau of Identification. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph G must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to the state Bureau of Identification. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph G must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks for the

Department of Education. The bureau may not use the fingerprints for any purpose other than that provided for under Title 20-A, section 6103. The bureau shall retain the fingerprints, except as provided under Title 20-A, section 6103, subsection 9. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph I and subsection 3, paragraph I must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks for the court and the Department of Public Safety, Gambling Control Board, respectively. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph J or S must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks for the Department of Administrative and Financial Services. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph P must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks for the Board of Osteopathic Licensure, established in Title 32, chapter 36. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph N must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks for the Board of Licensure in Medicine, established in Title 32, chapter 48. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph Q must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks for the State Board of Nursing, established in Title 32, chapter 31. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph O must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks under Title 28-B, section 204. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph R must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks for the Department of Health and Human Services. Fingerprints taken pursuant to subsection 1. paragraph U must be transmitted immediately to the State Bureau of Identification to enable the bureau to conduct state and national criminal history record checks for the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Office of Information Technology.

Sec. S-4. 5 MRSA §1982-A is enacted to read:

§1982-A. Criminal history record information for employees and contractors

<u>1. Definitions.</u> As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

- <u>A.</u> <u>"Federal Bureau of Investigation" means the United States Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation.</u>
- B. "State Police" means the Department of Public Safety, Bureau of State Police.

2. Background investigation requirements. The office shall perform fingerprint-based criminal history record checks for any person employed by the office, who may be offered employment by the office or who is employed by or may be offered employment by an office contractor or subcontractor to satisfy federal statutory and regulatory background investigation requirements, including but not limited to those established by the United States Internal Revenue Service's tax information security guidelines for federal, state and local agencies, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Criminal Justice Information Services Division's information security requirements for criminal history record information used for noncriminal justice purposes.

<u>The criminal history record checks must include fingerprinting and obtaining national</u> <u>criminal history record information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation.</u>

3. Fingerprint-based criminal history obtained. A person employed by the office or a person who is employed by an office contractor or subcontractor shall consent to and have the person's fingerprints taken. A person who may be offered employment by the office or by an office contractor or subcontractor shall consent to and have the person's fingerprints taken. A person who may be offered employment by the office or by an office contractor or subcontractor shall consent to and have the person's fingerprints taken prior to being employed by the office or by an office contractor or subcontractor. The State Police shall take or cause to be taken the fingerprints of a person who has consented under this subsection and shall forward the fingerprints to the Department of Public Safety so that the Department of Public Safety may conduct a state and national criminal history record check on the person. The Department of Public Safety shall forward the results obtained to the office. The fee charged to the office by the State Police must be consistent with the fee charged to executive branch agencies receiving similar services. Except for the portion of the payment that constitutes the processing fee charged by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, all money received by the State Police under this subsection must be paid to the Treasurer of State, who shall apply the money to the expenses of administration of this section by the Department of Public Safety.

4. Updates to information. The fingerprint-based criminal history record check under subsection 3 must be conducted at least once every 5 years as the office determines appropriate, or as required under federal regulations. The office may request continuous notifications of updated criminal history record information if a service providing notifications of updated criminal history record information becomes available. 5. Confidentiality. Information obtained pursuant to this section is confidential and may not be disseminated for purposes other than as provided in subsections 6 and 7.

6. Use of information obtained. Criminal history record information obtained pursuant to this section may be used by the office for employment purposes only. The information must only be used for making decisions regarding the suitability of a person described in this section for new or continued employment with the office. The subject of any criminal history record check under this section may contest any negative decision made by the office based upon the information received pursuant to the criminal history record check.

7. Person's access to information obtained. A person subject to the criminal history record check pursuant to subsection 3 must be notified each time a criminal history record check is performed on the person. A person subject to the background check under subsection 3 may inspect and review the criminal history record information pursuant to Title 16, section 709 and obtain federal information obtained pursuant to the criminal history record check by following the procedures outlined in 28 Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 16.32 and 16.33.

8. Right of subject to remove fingerprints from record. Upon request from a person subject to a criminal history record check pursuant to subsection 3, the Department of Public Safety shall remove the person's fingerprints from the Department of Public Safety's records and provide written confirmation of the removal to the person.

<u>9. Refusal to consent.</u> The office may not employ or utilize a person who has refused to consent to the background investigation requirements under this section in a position for which such background investigations are required under sub-section 2.

PART S SUMMARY

This Part implements criminal history record checks for certain individuals with access to Federal Tax Information and other federally-protected data types at the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Office of Information Technology. The criminal history record checks will apply to all new applicants, all current employees, contractors or subcontractors to ensure compliance with federal laws and regulations governing access to federally-protected data types, including, but not limited to the Internal Revenue Service's criminal history record check requirements for all employees and contractors with access to federal tax information and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Criminal Justice Information Services Division.
