Justification:

The Academy runs the basic training programs for law enforcement and corrections personnel which results in the cadets obtaining certification. The Academy also trains certified officers to become instructors. These instructors teach at the basic training program and conduct in-service training across the state.

This position will focus on instruction in the areas of Use of Force, firearms and other mandatory training topics. All cadets at the Academy are required to complete training in these high-risk areas. The Training Coordinator must have relevant knowledge in these areas and a solid understanding of the associated legal parameters of these programs. The Academy's Board of Trustees recently added Use of Force training as a required in-service hands-on topic starting in 2021. This means that all certified law enforcement officers in Maine must receive this training. To accomplish this, this Training Coordinator must recruit certified officers to become instructors on this topic, provide that instruction to the recruits and then oversee the training programs to ensure that the Academy's standards are met.

This position will be responsible for professional services work which involves the coordination and provision of education and training to law enforcement and corrections personnel. Work includes: developing curricula, establishing criteria for educational goals and objectives, and for selecting and evaluating instructors who will be teaching in law enforcement and corrections programs in the basic training programs along with in-service training programs. The Training Coordinator will help develop, plan, schedule, conduct and evaluate these programs in both corrections and law enforcement training.

Justification:

This transfer recognizes the importance of providing a stable funding source for a position that is critical to the emergency medical data systems that are used by ambulance services and hospitals throughout the State. Any remaining federal resources will fund operational costs to support the position and data systems previously paid for by the General Fund as long as the federal funding is available.

This essential position is known within the Bureau as the Data and Preparedness Coordinator. In that role, this position is responsible for providing primary technical support for the data systems used by all emergency medical service providers for patient care reporting (~ 300,000/calls/year) and for personnel and service licensing (annually: 2,000 personnel, 275 services, 500 ambulances). These systems also integrate with others such as the Health Information Exchange and with Maine Center for Disease Control for syndromic surveillance (e.g. opiate overdoses). This position is also the primary Maine Emergency Medical Services staff contact with Maine Center for Disease Control and Maine Emergency Management Agency for preparedness planning and emergency response.

Replacement of this equipment is crucial for the examination of fire debris.

In a case in which the chief determines under rules adopted pursuant to this section that a law enforcement officer has died while in the line of duty or in a case in which the State Fire Marshal determines under rules adopted pursuant to this section that a firefighter has died while in the line of duty or in a case in which the director determines under rules adopted pursuant to this section that an emergency medical services person has died while in the line of duty, the State shall pay a benefit of \$50,000 \$100,000 as follows:

A. If there is no surviving child of the firefighter, law enforcement officer or emergency medical services person, to the surviving spouse of the person;

B. If there is a surviving child or children and a surviving spouse of the firefighter, law enforcement officer or emergency medical services person, 1/2 to the surviving child or children in equal shares and 1/2 to the surviving spouse;

C. If there is no surviving spouse of the firefighter, law enforcement officer or emergency medical services person, to the child or children in equal shares; or

D. If there is no surviving child or spouse, to the parent or parents of the firefighter, law enforcement officer or emergency medical services person in equal shares.

6. Other benefits. Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

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Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Index from July 1st to June 30th of the previous year. A firefighter, law enforcement officer, emergency medical services person or corrections officer who dies while in the line of duty must be paid the benefit amount as indexed immediately prior to that firefighter's, law enforcement officer's, emergency medical services person's or corrections officer's death. The Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall adopt rules to calculate the annual percentage increase in the death benefit.

The State shall pay the benefit as follows:

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A. If there is no surviving child of the firefighter, law enforcement officer or, emergency medical services person <u>or corrections officer</u>, to the surviving spouse of the person;

B. If there is a surviving child or children and a surviving spouse of the firefighter, law enforcement officer σ_{r} emergency medical services person <u>or corrections officer</u>, 1/2 to the surviving child or children in equal shares and 1/2 to the surviving spouse;

C. If there is no surviving spouse of the firefighter, law enforcement officer $\Theta r_{,}$ emergency medical services person <u>or corrections officer</u>, to the child or children in equal shares; or

2. Interim benefit payment. Interim benefits may be paid as follows.

A. When the State Fire Marshal determines upon showing of need and prior to final action that the death of a firefighter is a death for which a benefit will probably be paid, the State Fire Marshal may make an interim benefit payment not exceeding \$3,000 to the individual or individuals entitled to receive a benefit under subsection 1 in the manner set out in subsection 1.

B. When the chief determines upon showing of need and prior to final action that the death of an officer is a death for which a benefit will probably be paid, the chief may make an interim benefit payment not exceeding \$3,000 to the individual or individuals entitled to receive a benefit under subsection 1 in the manner set out in subsection 1.

C. When the director determines upon showing of need and prior to final action that the death of an emergency medical services person is a death for which a benefit will probably be paid, the director may make an interim benefit payment not exceeding \$3,000 to the individual or individuals entitled to receive a benefit under subsection 1 in the manner set out in subsection 1.

D. When the Commissioner of Corrections determines upon showing of need and prior to final action that the death of a corrections officer is a death for which a benefit will probably be paid, the commissioner may make an interim benefit payment not exceeding \$3,000 to the individual or individuals entitled to receive a benefit under subsection 1 in the manner set out in subsection 1.

3. Deduction of interim payment. The State Fire Marshal, the chief or, the director
 or the Commissioner of Corrections, as the case may be, shall deduct the amount of an

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interim payment made pursuant to subsection 2 from the amount of any final benefit paid to the individual or individuals entitled to receive a benefit under subsection 1.

4. Repayment of interim payment; waiver. If a final benefit is not paid, the recipient or recipients of any interim payment under subsection 2 are liable for repayment of the amount received. The State Fire Marshal in the case of a firefighter, the chief in the case of a law enforcement officer $\Theta_{\mathbf{x}}$ the director in the case of an emergency medical services person or the Commissioner of Corrections in the case of a corrections officer may waive all or part of the repayment if that official determines that undue hardship would result from that repayment.

5. Execution or attachment prohibited. A benefit paid under this section is not
 subject to execution or attachment.

6. Other benefits. SUMMARY

This amendment replaces the bill. The amendment changes the title to "An Act To Increase the Death Benefit for Firefighters, Law Enforcement Officers, Emergency Medical Services Personnel and Corrections Officers" and adds an emergency preamble and emergency clause to the bill. The amendment extends the death benefit to corrections officers and to emergency medical services personnel who serve in private emergency medical services agencies. The amendment increases the death benefit from \$50,000 to \$100,000 for a law enforcement officer, firefighter, emergency medical services person or corrections officer who dies while in the line of duty prior to July 1, 2021. For deaths occurring on or after July 1, 2021, the Department of Administrative and Financial Services is required to adopt rules to annually calculate an increase in the death benefit based on the previous year's increase in the Consumer Price Index.

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
