SUBJECT:	Biennial budget recommendations (LD 221, An Act Making Unified Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government, General Fund and Other Funds and Changing Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2021, June 30, 2022 and June 30, 2023)

Pursuant to Joint Rule 314, on March 4, 2021, the Joint Standing Committee on Energy, Utilities and Technology (EUT Committee) voted unanimously to approve the initiatives contained in Part A of the Governor's Biennial Budget (LD 221) that fall within the policy jurisdiction of the EUT Committee with the following exceptions:

- ConnectMaine Authority, page A-95, Ref. #488 and #489 (page 1 of the report back document)— The EUT Committee voted 8-4 in favor these initiatives (In favor: Sens. Lawrence and Vitelli; and Reps. Berry, Cuddy, Grohoski, Kessler, Wood and Zeigler. In opposition: Sen. Stewart and Reps. Carlow, Foster and Wadsworth those voting in opposition to these initiatives specified that the 10-cent surcharge instead be provided to the Public Utilities Commission to administer the Satellite-based Broadband Grant Fund see the discussion in Part AA below and the attached amendment to Part AA); and
- Public Advocate, page A-203, Ref. #1006, #1007, #1008 and # 1009 (pages 9 & 10 of the report back document) The EUT Committee voted 8-4 in favor these initiatives (In favor: Sens. Lawrence and Vitelli; and Reps. Berry, Cuddy, Grohoski, Kessler, Wood and Zeigler. In opposition: Sen. Stewart and Reps. Carlow, Foster and Wadsworth).

Part AA

In addition to the initiatives contained in Part A, the EUT Committee also voted 8-4 in favor of

Language Part, Part AA (In favor: Sens. Lawrence and Vitelli; and Reps. Berry, Cuddy, Grohoski, Kessler, Wood and Zeigler. In opposition: Sen. Stewart and Reps. Carlow, Foster and Wadsworth). Those four EUT Committee members voting in opposition to Language Part, Part AA offered an amendment to this part that would establish a satellite-based broadband grant fund. This amendment to Part AA would also result in a new initiative under the Public Utilities Commission's portion of the budget. (see attached for initiative information and amended Part AA language).

Public Utilities Commission - Headcount error

Lastly, on March 8, 2021, it was brought to our attention that there was an error on pages A-462 and A-464 related to the headcount for the Public Utilities Commission. The EUT Committee discussed this at its meeting on March 9, 2021, and understands "1" headcount needs to be added to correct the baseline and that no personal services funding is required. The EUT Committee voted unanimously to recommend correcting this error (10-0). We have highlighted below the changes needed to correct this headcount error.

Minority amendment to the Public Utilities Commission's portion of the Biennial Budget and Part AA

If the amendment to Part AA below is included in the Biennial Budget, an initiative will need to be added to the Public Utilities Commission's portion of the budget to reflect the creation of the satellite-based broadband grant fund and the 10 cents per month per line or number surcharge levied on each residential and business telephone exchange line, including private branch exchange lines and Centrex lines; semipublic coin and public access lines; customers of interconnected voice over Internet protocol service; and customers of cellular or wireless telecommunications service that is not prepaid wireless telecommunications service. This 10-cent surcharge would be instead of the 10-cent surcharge provided to the ConnectMaine Authority under Ref# 488 and Ref. #489.

Strike and replace Part AA with the following:

Sec. AA-1. 35-A MRSA §9219 is enacted to read:

§9219. Satellite-based broadband grants

<u>1. Definitions.</u> As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

A. "Applicant" means an individual that applies for a grant under this section.

B. "Fund" means the Satellite-based Broadband Grant Fund established in subsection 2.

<u>C.</u> "Satellite-based provider" means a broadband service provider that provides Internet access directly to consumers using satellite technology.

2. Fund established. The Satellite-based Broadband Grant Fund is established as a nonlapsing fund administered by the commission to provide grants to applicants in accordance with the purposes in subsection 3. All money in the fund must be continuously applied by the commission to carry out this section. The commission may receive and deposit in the fund funds from the following sources:

<u>A. Satellite-based broadband grant surcharges received pursuant to subsection 6</u>
 <u>B. Federal funds and awards that may be used for the purposes of this section; and</u>
 <u>C. Any other funds from public or private sources received in support of the purposes for which the fund is established.</u>

3. Purpose of fund. The fund is established to address the need in the State for access to broadband services, particularly in the unserved or underserved areas of the State, by providing grants to eligible applicants for installation and other advance costs associated with the acquisition of broadband access from a satellite-based provider. To the extent funds are available, the fund must be used to provide grants to applicants meeting the requirements of subsection 4 and in accordance with the award criteria in subsection 5.

4. Grant requirements. An applicant for a grant under this section must submit an application to the commission on a form prepared and made available by the commission. The commission shall establish application requirements for grants under this section, which must include, but are not limited to:

A. A requirement that grants be awarded only to individuals applying on behalf of a residential household and that grants may not be awarded to business entities;

B. A requirement that an applicant may not have previously received a grant under the program;

<u>C.</u> A requirement that an applicant provide information regarding the satellite-based provider from which the applicant intends to acquire broadband access;

D. A requirement that an applicant provide documentation of the installation and other advance costs required by the satellite-based provider for the applicant to initially acquire broadband access;

E. A prohibition on the awarding of grants for broadband access costs not described in paragraph D, such as monthly service charges; and

F. A prohibition on the awarding of grants for broadband access costs associated with broadband providers that are not satellite-based providers.

5. Awarding of grants; additional criteria. To the extent funds are available and in

accordance with this subsection, the commission shall award grants to applicants that have provided the required information under subsection 4 and meet any other eligibility criteria established by the commission.

A. The maximum amount of a grant that may be awarded to an applicant is \$500.

B. The commission may not award more than one grant under this section to the same residential household.

C. The commission shall prioritize the awarding of grants to applicants located in unserved or underserved areas of the State.

6. Satellite-based broadband grant surcharge. Beginning January 1, 2022, a satellite-based broadband grant surcharge of 10 cents per month per line or number is imposed in accordance with this subsection.

A. The surcharge may not be imposed on more than 25 lines or numbers per customer billing account. B. The surcharge must be collected on a monthly basis by each local exchange telephone utility, cellular or wireless telecommunications service provider and interconnected voice over Internet protocol service provider from:

(1) Each residential and business telephone exchange line, including private branch exchange lines and Centrex lines;

(2) Each semipublic coin and public access line;

(3) Each customer of interconnected voice over Internet protocol service; and

(4) Each customer of cellular or wireless telecommunications service that is not prepaid wireless

telecommunications service, except that a surcharge may not be levied on a customer of cellular or wireless telecommunications service that is supported by federal universal service support funds pursuant to 47 Code of Federal Regulations, Part 54.

C. The surcharge collected pursuant to paragraph B must be shown separately as a statewide satellitebased broadband grant surcharge on the customer's bill.

D. The surcharge collected pursuant to paragraph B, must be remitted on a monthly basis and within one month of the month collected to the commission for deposit into the satellite-based broadband grant fund.

<u>E. For the purposes of this subsection, the place of residence of a cellular or wireless telecommunications</u> service customer must be determined according to the sourcing rules for mobile telecommunications services as set forth in Title 36, section 2556.

7. Collaboration with ConnectMaine Authority; technical assistance. At the request of the commission, the authority shall provide to the commission all information and assistance necessary for the administration of this section. The commission may provide technical assistance to applicants who request assistance with the grant application process under this section.

8. Rules; application procedure. The commission may adopt rules to implement this section, including rules governing the application process for grants under this section and rules governing

the satellite-based broadband grant surcharge. Rules adopted under this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

PART AA SUMMARY

This Part establishes a satellite-based broadband grant program, to be developed and administered by the Public Utilities Commission, to provide grants of up to \$500 to individuals for installation costs and other advance costs associated with the initial acquisition of broadband access from a satellite-based broadband provider. Under the program, grant priority is to be given to applicants from unserved or underserved areas of the State. This grant program is funded through a 10 cents per month per line or number surcharge levied on each residential and business telephone exchange line, including private branch exchange lines and Centrex lines; semipublic coin and public access lines; customers of interconnected voice over Internet protocol service; and customers of cellular or wireless telecommunications service that is not prepaid wireless telecommunications service.

Justification:

This initiative reduces allocation in All Other to align with revenues no longer received from natural gas assessments. Public Law 2019, chapter 313 authorized Efficiency Maine Trust (EMT), as separate entity, to assume collection of natural gas assessments revenue directly and presume the role of paying All Other expenses internally that historically was paid entirely by the State of Maine accounting system. This initiative reduces All Other allocation to match the revenue needed to pay All Other costs associated with one employee who opted to stay with the State and not become an employee of EMT. Personal Services allocation had been reduced in earlier legislation without reducing All Other. This initiative reduces the All Other line.

Sec. AA-1. 35-A MRSA §9211 is amended to read:

2-A. Surcharge; collection. Beginning January 1, 2020, in addition to the assessment imposed pursuant to subsection 2, a <u>ConnectME ConnectMaine</u> surcharge of 10¢ per line or number is imposed. The assessment imposed pursuant to subsection 2 and the surcharge imposed pursuant to this subsection must be collected from the customer on a monthly basis by each communications service provider. Revenue must be deposited in the fund.

<u>3. ConnectMaine fund surcharge; Beginning January 1, 2022, the ConnectMaine surcharge, of 10 cents per month per line imposed in subsection 2-A is levied on:</u>

(1) Each residential and business telephone exchange line, including private branch exchange lines and Centrex lines;

(2) Semipublic coin and public access lines;

(3) Customers of interconnected voice over Internet protocol service; and

(4) Customers of cellular or wireless telecommunications service that is not prepaid wireless telecommunications service;

<u>The Surcharge may not be imposed on more than 25 lines per customer billing the account.</u> <u>Revenue must be deposited in the fund.</u>

-3.<u>4</u>. Explicit identification of assessment and surcharge on customer bills. A communications service provider assessed pursuant to subsection 2 may recover the amount of the assessment from the provider's customers. If a provider recovers the amount from its customers, it must explicitly identify the amount owed by a customer on the customer's bill and indicate that the funds are collected for use in the ConnectMaine Fund. Beginning January 1, 2020, the ConnectME surcharge imposed pursuant to subsection 2-A must be shown separately from the assessment imposed pursuant to subsection 2 as a statewide ConnectME surcharge on the customer's bill. Beginning January 1, 2022, the ConnectMaine surcharge imposed pursuant to subsection 2 as a statewide customer's bill.
