LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY March 25, 2021

CALL TO ORDER

Speaker Fecteau called the March 25, 2021 meeting of the 130th Legislative Council to order at 1:35 p.m.

REPORTS FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND COUNCIL OFFICES

Fiscal Report

Chris Nolan, Director, Office of Fiscal and Program Review, presented the following report.

1. General Fund Revenue Update

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$134.8 million (92.7%) for the month of February and over budget by \$287.2 million (11.6%) for the fiscal year to date. As explained in more detail below, the significant positive revenue variance for February is largely the result of the timing of individual income refunds with the delay in filing resulting in refunds significantly less than budgeted levels for February.

Individual income tax revenue was over budget by \$115.0 million for the month and by \$206.1 million for the fiscal year to date. Individual income tax refunds were \$96.7 million less than budget (positive impact on revenue) for the month and \$103.2 million less for the fiscal year to date. It is expected this February variance is a timing issue that will be offset in March. Withholding revenue was above budget by \$16.2 million for February and by \$32.2 million for the fiscal year to date, while individual estimated payments were \$2.6 million over budget for the month and \$63.9 million above budget for the fiscal year to date.

Corporate income tax revenue was below budget by \$0.9 million for the month but over budget by \$23.4 million for the fiscal year to date. The positive variance for the fiscal year to date is largely the result of estimated payments exceeding budget by \$23.7 million. Sales and use tax revenue (January sales) was over budget by \$24.1 million for the month and by 57.4 million (5.1%) for the fiscal year.

Highway Fund revenue was over budget by 0.7 million (2.9%) for the month of February and over budget by \$2.1 million (0.9%) for the fiscal year to date. Fuel taxes were under budget by \$1.1 million for the month and by \$1.7 million for the fiscal year to date. Motor vehicle registrations and fees were over budget by \$1.7 million for the month and by \$3.5 million for the fiscal year to date.

3. Cash Balances Update

The average balance in the cash pool for February was \$2,863.1 million, an increase from January's average of \$2,630.7 million. While the average balance from federal Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) payments continued to decrease (from \$404.7 million in January to \$322.7 million in February), the increase in the overall cash pool balance is largely the result of an increase in the General Fund balance and the new federal emergency rental assistance. The average Highway Fund balance in February was \$59.1 million, an increase from January's average of \$45.2 million.

4. Economic and Revenue Forecast

The Economic Forecasting Commission is scheduled to meet on March 30, 2021 to review and update the economic forecast for its April 1st report. The Revenue Forecasting Committee will meet during the last week of April to review and update the revenue forecast for its statutory reporting date of May 1st.

Members of the Legislative Council discussed the issue.

Sen. Timberlake expressed his hope that the State House will be able to open back up soon.

1. General Fund Revenue Update (see attached)

General Fund revenue was under budget by \$9.1 million (4.6%) for the month of March and over budget by \$278.1 million (10.4%) for the fiscal year to date.

Individual income tax revenue was under budget by \$33.5 million for the month but over budget by \$172.6 million for the fiscal year to date. Individual income tax refunds were \$77.3 million more than budget (negative impact on revenue) for the month but \$25.9 million less for the fiscal year to date. The March positive variance corrects a large portion of the negative refund variance from February. Individual income tax withholding revenue was above budget by \$32.2 million for March and by \$64.3 million for the fiscal year to date, while individual estimated payments were \$3.3 million over budget for the month and \$67.1 million above budget for the fiscal year to date.

Corporate income tax revenue was over budget by \$2.7 million for the month and by \$26.1 million for the fiscal year to date. The positive variance for the fiscal year to date was largely the result of estimated payments exceeding budget by \$26.6 million. Sales and use tax revenue (February sales) was over budget by \$17.1 million for the month and by \$74.5 million for the fiscal year to date.

Highway Fund revenue was over budget by \$2.0 million (9.1%) for the month of March and over budget by \$4.1 million (1.7%) for the fiscal year to date. Fuel taxes were under budget by \$0.2 million for the month and by \$1.9 million for the fiscal year to date. Motor vehicle registrations and fees were over budget by \$2.3 million for the month and by \$5.7 million for the fiscal year to date.

3. Cash Balances Update

The average balance in the cash pool for March was \$2,644.5 million, a decrease from February's average of \$2,863.1 million. The decrease was largely the result of the continued decrease in the average balance from federal Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) payments (from \$322.7 million in February to \$274.6 million in March), and a decrease in the General Fund balance which is typical in the months prior to the individual income tax filing deadline. The average Highway Fund balance in March was \$58.0 million, a decrease from February's average of \$59.1 million.

4. Economic and Revenue Forecast

The Consensus Economic Forecasting Commission (CEFC) met on March 30, 2021 to review and update the economic forecast for its <u>April 1st Report</u>. Overall the CEFC was more optimistic in its April forecast and saw reduced uncertainty from its two previous forecasts. A significant change made in the forecast was the upward revision for personal income growth to +5.0% for 2021 compared to -0.5% in its previous forecast. The Revenue Forecasting Committee (RFC) will meet on April 27th to review and update the revenue forecast for its statutory May 1st report.
