- Authorized by the FY22-23 biennial budget
- \$149.8 million
- One-time payments to Mainers who worked during the pandemic
- Provide relief to working people who showed up and kept Maine running through the early days of COVID-19



- Eligibility is determined by 2020 tax year
- Claimed earned income
 - wages, salaries, tips, or other taxable employee pay
- Filed a Maine individual income tax return as a full-year resident



- Federal adjusted gross income for the 2020 tax year that is less than:
 - \$150,000 if married filing a joint return or a qualifying widow or widower
 - \$112,500 if filing as head of household
 - \$75,000 if single or married filing separately
- Not claimed as a dependent
- Filed no later than October 31, 2021

Payment Amount



\$149.8 Million 535,000 Eligible Recipients

Approximately \$275 Payment

- Payments will arrive via paper check via USPS
- Beginning early to mid-November
- Over a period of five to six weeks
- Arriving no later than December 31, 2021
- NO application required

- An Act To Establish a Local Fiscal Recovery Funds Program and Allocation (LD 1507, now PL21, c.45)
- An Act To Establish a Homeowner Assistance Fund Program and Provide for the Distribution of Funds (LD 1697, now PL21, c.77)
- An Act To Provide Allocations for the Administration of State Fiscal Recovery Funds (LD 1700, now PL21, c.78)
- An Act To Provide Allocations for the Distribution of State Fiscal Recovery Funds (LD 1733, now PL21, c.483)

\$4.6 billion impact to Maine

\$1.5 billion for State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds

\$3.1 billion earmarked by Federal government

\$1 billion in discretionary **State Fiscal Recovery Funds**, which we call **Maine Jobs & Recovery Plan**

\$500 million in Local Fiscal Recovery Funds to local governments across Maine

\$119.2 million to municipal NEUs, with the State serving as a pass-through Payments to local government entities, direct from Federal government

Allowable Uses

- water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure
- addressing the public health impacts of COVID-19
- replacing lost public sector revenue
- providing financial resources to affected small businesses
- providing premium pay to public health and safety employees performing essential work during the pandemic, such as 911 operators or EMS staff

ARPA: Local Fiscal Recovery

Payments as Pass-Through from State

477 Maine towns and cities known as non-entitlement units or "NEUs"

\$500 million in Local Fiscal Recovery Funds to local governments across Maine

EUs, with the State serving as a pass-through Payments to local government entities, direct from Federal government

\$59.6 MM available in first tranche

\$52.9 MM in payments to date

\$4.7 MM in payments slated for this wk

> \$2 MM remains unclaimed



ARPA: Local Fiscal Recovery \rightarrow NEUs

• States:

- maintain documentation that supports disbursement
- disburse payments to NEUs
- report to U.S. Treasury on disbursements
- "guarantee 60 days" for NEUs to access this funding
- NOT required to understand how the funds will be or are used
- NEUs should:
 - apply for and receive funds from State
 - monitor and report on use of the funds directly to U.S. Treasury
 - adhere to any local requirements

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ARPA: State Fiscal Recovery

Allowable Uses

- support urgent COVID-19 response efforts to continue to decrease spread of the virus and bring the pandemic under control
- replace lost public sector revenue to strengthen support for vital public services and help retain jobs
- support immediate economic stabilization for households and businesses
- address systemic public health and economic challenges that have contributed to the inequal impact of the pandemic



- This is a transformational opportunity to prepare for swift and decisive action on a plan to continue Maine's economic recovery and achieve long-term growth for Maine people, businesses, and communities, in three categories:
 - immediate economic recovery
 - long-term economic growth
 - infrastructure revitalization
- Drawing on recommendations from the Governor's Economic Recovery Committee and the State's 10-Year Economic Development Strategy

• Part One Business Case includes:

- baseline project description and overview
- designating staff lead for each project
- identifying likely resource needs hiring, procurement, technology, etc.
- planning how to improve equity, reduce disparities, and/or increase diversity through the project
- Part One approval allows:
 - commencement of drafting any Request for Proposals (RFPs)
 - development of Functional Job Assessments (FJAs)
 - submission of Financial Orders (FOs)



• Part Two Business Case includes:

- initiative goals
- initiative objectives
- key performance indicators (KPIs)
- reporting details
- considering the public rollout and communication plan
- engaging with constituents and community stakeholders
- developing appropriate fiscal controls and oversight processes
- Part Two approval allows:
 - fund disbursement
 - formal agency commitments
 - deployment



- Prepare and submit detailed quarterly federal reporting on spending and programmatic results
- October 18th: \$139 million to support Maine's small businesses and workforce
- October 25th: \$13.5 million to encourage people to pursue health care jobs in Maine and strengthen the State's health care workforce



- Interim guidance available now from U.S. Treasury
 - still awaiting final guidance
- States that can prove "qualified revenue loss" will have more flexibility in allowable uses
