## An Act To Expand Transitional Assistance for Families

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: 2 Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §3762, sub-§8, as amended by PL 2011, c. 655, Pt. S, §§1 and 3 2, is further amended to read: 4 8. Transitional support services. The department shall administer a program of transitional support services in accordance with PRWORA, DRA and this subsection. 5 6 A. The department shall administer a program of transitional Medicaid to families receiving benefits under Section 1931 of the federal Social Security Act in 7 8 accordance with this paragraph. 9 (1) The department shall provide transitional Medicaid to families whose 10 average gross monthly earnings, less costs to the family for child care necessary for employment, do not exceed 185% 200% of the federal poverty guidelines in 11 accordance with PRWORA and this subsection. In order to receive transitional 12 Medicaid as the result of increased earnings or number of hours worked, a family 13 must have received Medicaid assistance for at least 3 of the last 6 months, except 14 15 as provided in subparagraph (2). (2) The department shall provide transitional Medicaid for families whose 16 eligibility for Medicaid assistance terminated due to employment obtained 17 through work search activities pursuant to this chapter, in which case the family 18 must have received Medicaid assistance for at least one of the last 3 months. 19 20 (3) To continue to receive transitional Medicaid assistance following the first 6921 months of coverage, a family entering the transitional Medicaid program with income above 133% of the federal poverty guidelines must pay premiums in 22 23 accordance with rules adopted by the department. (5) The department shall provide transitional Medicaid for -4-6 months to 24 families whose eligibility for Medicaid assistance terminated due to an increase 25 in the amount of child support received by the family. 26 27 (6) The department shall require reporting of income or circumstances for the purpose of determining eligibility and premium payments, copayments or other 28 methods of cost sharing for benefits under this paragraph in accordance with 29 30 rules adopted by the department. 31 (7) The scope of services provided under this paragraph must be the same as the scope of services provided when a family received Medicaid assistance. 32 33 B. The department shall provide limited transitional transportation benefits to meet employment-related costs to ASPIRE-TANF program participants who lose 34 35 eligibility for TANF assistance due to employment. Benefits may be provided for up to 12 18 months following loss of TANF eligibility. The department may adopt rules 36 that impose a weekly limit on available transitional transportation benefits and that 37 38 require a contribution from each participant toward the cost of transportation. 39 The department shall make available transitional child care services to families C. who lose eligibility for TANF as a result of increased earnings or an increase in the 40 41 number of hours worked. The department shall make available transitional child care

1 services to families who lose eligibility for TANF as a result of increased earnings or 2 an increase in the number of hours worked and whose gross income is equal to or less 3 than 250% 300% of the federal poverty guidelines. The department may also make transitional child care services available to families in which one or both adults are 4 working and who, although they remain financially eligible for TANF benefits, 5 6 request that their benefits be terminated. The family shall pay a premium of 2% to 10% of gross income, based on the family's gross income compared to the federal 7 poverty level in accordance with rules adopted by the department. Parents must have 8 9 a choice of child care within the rate established by the department.

- E. Beginning October 1, 2011, the department shall establish maximum rates for
  child care that are at least equal to the 75th percentile of local market rates for various
  categories of child care and higher rates for children with special needs.
- F. The department may provide limited transitional food benefits to meet the needs
  of food supplement benefit recipients living with one or more dependent children
  under 18 years of age who are working at least 30 hours per week or who are working
  at least 20 hours per week if one or more dependent child is under 6 years of age.
  The benefit may not exceed \$50 \$75 per month per family.

## SUMMARY

19 This bill expands transitional benefits for families that lose eligibility for assistance 20 under the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program and the MaineCare 21 program because of increased income and for certain working families that receive 22 supplemental nutrition assistance as follows.

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- For families that were eligible for MaineCare because their income was below
   150% of the federal poverty level, it expands the upper limit of financial eligibility for
   transitional Medicaid from 185% to 200% of the federal poverty guidelines, extends the
   time period during which payment of premiums for transitional Medicaid is not required
   from 6 to 9 months and, for families whose ineligibility is due to increased child support,
   extends the period of eligibility for transitional Medicaid from 4 to 6 months.
- 29 2. For families that lose eligibility for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families due
  30 to employment, it expands transitional transportation benefits from 12 to 18 months.
- 31 3. For families that lose eligibility for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families due 32 to increased earnings or increased hours of work, it expands financial eligibility for 33 transitional child care services from 250% to 300% of the federal poverty guidelines.
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  4. For certain working families that receive supplemental nutrition assistance, it expands transitional food assistance from \$50 per month to \$75 per month.
