### **An Act To Prohibit Employment Discrimination Based on a Prior Criminal Conviction**

1 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

2 **Sec. 1. 26 MRSA §600** is enacted to read:

3 **§600. Protection from employment discrimination for persons with prior criminal**  
4 **convictions**

5 A person may not be disqualified from employment or be disqualified to engage in an  
6 occupation for which a license, permit or certificate is required because of a prior  
7 conviction of a crime within or without the State. A person may be denied employment  
8 or may be denied a license, permit or certificate to engage in an occupation by reason of  
9 the prior conviction of a crime if the offense has a reasonable relationship to the functions  
10 of the employment or occupation for which the license, permit or certificate is sought or  
11 if the person is disqualified by statute from the occupation for which a license, permit or  
12 certificate is sought.

13 **SUMMARY**

14 This bill protects persons who have a prior conviction of a crime from employment  
15 discrimination by providing that a person with a prior conviction may not be disqualified  
16 from employment or an occupation that requires a license, permit or certificate on the  
17 basis of that conviction unless the offense for which the person was convicted has a  
18 reasonable relationship to the functions of the employment or occupation or the person is  
19 disqualified from that occupation by state statute.
