An Act To Ensure Access to Information in the Property Tax Abatement and Appeals Process

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 36 MRSA §842, as amended by PL 2001, c. 396, §16, is further amended to read:

4 **§842.** Notice of decision

5 The assessors or municipal officers shall give to any person applying to them for an abatement of taxes notice in writing of their decision upon the application within 10 days 6 7 after they take final action thereon. If the application for abatement is denied, the notice of the decision must state the reason for the denial. The notice of decision must state that 8 the applicant has 60 days from the date the notice is received to appeal the decision. It 9 must also identify the board or agency designated by law to hear the appeal. If the 10 assessors or municipal officers, before whom an application in writing for the abatement 11 of a tax is pending, fail to give written notice of their decision within 60 days from the 12 date of filing of the application, the application is deemed to have been denied, and the 13 applicant may appeal as provided in sections 843 and 844 approved, unless the applicant 14 has in writing consented to further delay. Denial in this manner is final action for the 15 purposes of notification under this section but failure to send notice of decision does not 16 affect the applicant's right of appeal. This section does not apply to applications for 17 18 abatement made under section 841, subsection 2.

21 1. Municipalities. If a municipality has adopted a board of assessment review and 22 the assessors or the municipal officers refuse to make the abatement asked for, the applicant may apply in writing to the board of assessment review within 60 days after 23 24 notice of the decision from which the appeal is being taken or after the application is deemed to have been denied, and, if the board thinks the applicant is over-assessed, the 25 applicant is granted such reasonable abatement as the board thinks proper. If the board of 26 27 assessment review does not grant the abatement requested by the applicant, the board shall notify the applicant in writing of the reason for not fully granting the request. 28 Except with regard to nonresidential property or properties with an equalized municipal 29 valuation of \$1,000,000 or greater either separately or in the aggregate, either party may 30 appeal from the decision of the board of assessment review directly to the Superior Court, 31 in accordance with Rule 80B of the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure. If the board of 32 assessment review fails to give written notice of its decision within 60 days of the date 33 the application is filed, unless the applicant agrees in writing to further delay, the 34 35 application is deemed denied and the applicant may appeal to Superior Court as if there had been a written denial to be approved. 36

1-A. Nonresidential property of \$1,000,000 or greater. With regard to nonresidential property or properties with an equalized municipal valuation of \$1,000,000 or greater either separately or in the aggregate, either party may appeal the decision of the local board of assessment review or the primary assessing area board of assessment review to the State Board of Property Tax Review within 60 days after notice of the decision from which the appeal is taken or after the application is deemed to be denied

1 approved, as provided in subsections 1 and 2. The board shall hold a hearing de novo. If 2 the board thinks that the applicant is over-assessed, it shall grant such reasonable 3 abatement as the board thinks proper. If the board of assessment review does not grant the abatement requested by the applicant, the board shall notify the applicant in writing of 4 the reason for not fully granting the request. For the purposes of this section, 5 6 "nonresidential property" means property that is used primarily for commercial, industrial or business purposes, excluding unimproved land that is not associated with a 7 commercial, industrial or business use. 8

2. Primary assessing areas. If a primary assessing area has adopted a board of 11 assessment review and the assessors or municipal officers refuse to make the abatement 12 asked for, the applicant may apply in writing to the board of assessment review within 60 13 days after notice of the decision from which the appeal is being taken or after the 14 15 application is deemed to have been denied, and if the board thinks the applicant is overassessed, the applicant is granted such reasonable abatement as the board thinks proper. 16 If the board of assessment review does not grant the abatement requested by the 17 18 applicant, the board shall notify the applicant in writing of the reason for not fully granting the request. Except with regard to nonresidential property or properties with an 19 20 equalized municipal valuation of \$1,000,000 or greater, either separately or in the 21 aggregate, either party may appeal the decision of the board of assessment review directly to the Superior Court, in accordance with the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 80B. 22 23 If the board of assessment review fails to give written notice of its decision within 60 days of the date the application was filed, unless the applicant agrees in writing to further 24 delay, the application is deemed denied and the applicant may appeal to the Superior 25 26 Court as if there had been a written denial to be approved.

Sec. 4. 36 MRSA §844, sub-§1, as amended by PL 2001, c. 396, §18, is further
amended to read:

Except when the 29 1. Municipalities without board of assessment review. municipality or primary assessing area has adopted a board of assessment review, if the 30 31 assessors or the municipal officers refuse to make the abatement asked for, the applicant may apply to the county commissioners within 60 days after notice of the decisions from 32 which the appeal is being taken or within 60 days after the application is deemed to have 33 been denied. If the commissioners think that the applicant is over-assessed, the applicant 34 is granted such reasonable abatement as the commissioners think proper. If the 35 commissioners do not grant the abatement requested by the applicant, the commissioners 36 37 shall notify the applicant in writing of the reason for not fully granting the request. If the 38 applicant has paid the tax, the applicant is reimbursed out of the municipal treasury, with costs in either case. If the applicant fails, the commissioners shall allow costs to the 39 40 municipality, taxed as in a civil action in the Superior Court, and issue their warrant of distress against the applicant for collection of the amount due the municipality. The 41 commissioners may require the assessors or municipal clerk to produce the valuation by 42 43 which the assessment was made or a copy of it. Either party may appeal from the decision of the county commissioners to the Superior Court, in accordance with the 44

Maine Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 80B. If the county commissioners fail to give written notice of their decision within 60 days of the date the application is filed, unless the applicant agrees in writing to further delay, the application is deemed denied and the applicant may appeal to the Superior Court as if there had been a written denial to be approved.

6 Sec. 5. 36 MRSA §844, sub-§2, as amended by PL 2011, c. 548, §13, is further 7 amended to read:

8 2. Nonresidential property of \$1,000,000 or greater. Notwithstanding subsection 1, the applicant may appeal the decision of the assessors or the municipal officers on a 9 10 request for abatement with respect to nonresidential property or properties having an equalized municipal valuation of \$1,000,000 or greater, either separately or in the 11 aggregate, to the State Board of Property Tax Review within 60 days after notice of the 12 decision from which the appeal is taken or after the application is deemed to be denied. If 13 the State Board of Property Tax Review determines that the applicant is over-assessed, it 14 15 shall grant such reasonable abatement as it determines proper. If the State Board of Property Tax Review does not grant the abatement requested by the applicant, the board 16 shall notify the applicant in writing of the reason for not fully granting the request. For 17 18 the purposes of this subsection, "nonresidential property" means property that is used 19 primarily for commercial, industrial or business purposes, excluding unimproved land that is not associated with a commercial, industrial or business use. 20

23 5. Testimony; record; notice. The transcript or tape recording of testimony, if such 24 a transcript or tape recording has been prepared by the board, and the exhibits, with all 25 papers and requests filed in the proceeding, constitute the record. Decisions become a part of the record and must include a statement of findings and conclusions, as well as the 26 27 reasons or basis for those findings and conclusions, upon the material issues of fact, law or discretion presented and the appropriate order, relief or denial of relief. If the board 28 determines that the applicant is over-assessed, it shall grant such reasonable abatement as 29 the board determines proper. If the board does not grant the abatement requested by the 30 31 applicant, the board shall notify the applicant in writing of the reason for not fully granting the request. Notice of a decision must be mailed or hand delivered to all parties 32 and the county commissioners within 10 days of the board's decision. 33

36 5. Testimony; record; notice. The transcript or tape recording of testimony, if such a transcript or tape recording has been prepared by the board, and the exhibits, with all 37 38 papers and requests filed in the proceeding, constitute the record. Decisions become a part of the record and must include a statement of findings and conclusions, as well as the 39 40 reasons or basis for those findings and conclusions, upon the material issues of fact, law 41 or discretion presented and the appropriate order, relief or denial of relief. If the board determines that the applicant is over-assessed, it shall grant such reasonable abatement as 42 43 the board determines proper. If the board does not grant the abatement requested by the applicant, the board shall notify the applicant in writing of the reason for not fully
granting the request. Notice of a decision must be mailed or hand delivered to all parties
and the municipal officers or the executive committee, where applicable, within 10 days
of the board's decision.

SUMMARY

6 This bill provides that a property taxpayer applying for or appealing an abatement of 7 property taxes is entitled to notice in writing stating the reason the applicant's request was 8 not fully granted. The bill also provides that if a decision on a request for abatement is 9 not made within the required time period the request is deemed to be approved.

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
