

§3152. Effect of registration for enforcement

1. Registered when filed. A support order or income-withholding order issued in another state or a foreign support order is registered when the order is filed in the registering tribunal of this State. [PL 2009, c. 95, §63 (AMD); PL 2009, c. 95, §87 (AFF).]

2. Enforceability of registered order. A registered support order issued in another state or a foreign country is enforceable in the same manner and is subject to the same procedures as an order issued by a tribunal of this State. [PL 2009, c. 95, §63 (AMD); PL 2009, c. 95, §87 (AFF).]

3. Recognition and enforcement of registered order; no modification. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, a tribunal of this State shall recognize and enforce, but may not modify, a registered support order if the issuing tribunal had jurisdiction. [PL 2009, c. 95, §63 (AMD); PL 2009, c. 95, §87 (AFF).]
