## §4364-D. Child care services in residential areas

- **1. Definitions.** As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
  - A. "Child care facility" has the same meaning as in Title 22, section 8301-A, subsection 1-A, paragraph B. [PL 2025, c. 288, §2 (NEW).]
  - B. "Family child care provider" has the same meaning as in Title 22, section 8301-A, subsection 1-A, paragraph C. [PL 2025, c. 288, §2 (NEW).]

**2.** Location of child care. A child care facility or a family child care provider is a permitted use in a municipal area that is zoned for residential purposes, subject to the same requirements for other residential property.
