#### READ.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Flood.

Senator FLOOD: Thank you very much Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. I'd like to speak about a great person who is being honored here today with this sentiment, our Deputy Commissioner in DAFS, Terry Brann. First thing that I would like to do is to wish the gentleman the best of luck. He's moving on to become the Director of Finance with Maine General Health, having helped us for 27 years in state government leadership primarily in the areas of auditing, budgeting, and controller functions where I got to know him very well. He's now retiring as our Co-Deputy Commissioner in DAFS. As you can tell from the sentiment, he was hired in 1987, worked in a variety of important positions in the Controller's Office, and became the State Controller in 2009, where I spent most of my time working with him. He's been very, very helpful throughout eight years of budgeting that I've been working on and he's particularly been helpful in clarifying items that are in the comprehensive annual

financial report, health insurance issues, and supplying answers to endless questions surrounding some of our most difficult policy issues from conservation to human resources to education. He's been a go-to person, I know, for Commissioner Millett and for others on many complex policy areas that come up. I do want to mention that sometimes the Appropriations Committee meets until late hours and usually Mr. Brann would be with us during those late hours. Committee members value his openness and his expertise and his guidance was always welcome and outstanding. Terry and I share a common bond in that he is, and has been, the primary author of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report and I actually read it. His knowledgeable support always was provided with a very calm demeanor. accurately and timely, and in an environment that wasn't necessarily always calm and timely. I'm proud to have worked with a gentleman with such integrity. He's a true statesman. I will miss his presence in our committee and his outstanding capabilities and his helpfulness. I wish him the best in his new career. I do want to close by reminding Mr. Brann that, in a moment of his personal weakness a few years back, he gave me his personal cell phone number and said, "Call any time if you need help." I'll take that literally. Thank you very much, Terry Brann. Thank you very much, Mr. President.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Cain.

Senator CAIN: Thank you Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I want to add my words of congratulations and thanks to Mr. Brann. I want to start by saying that I have always thought the very best title one could have in all of state government was the title of Controller. It just sort of has an ominous gravitas to it. Then when you meet Terry, Terry is kind and friendly and smart and thoughtful and extremely competent and he brings a much more human side to such an ominous title and powerful title of Controller. We will miss him very much. He has served us well in the Appropriations Committee, the Legislature, and all of state government for many years. We're glad he's not going far. We're glad to know his skills will be put to work to help Maine and Maine's healthcare system grow and be financially sounds. We are very appreciative of all of his work and dedication to state government. Even though his next title may not be as cool or as amazing as Controller, I do trust that the work he will do will be just as outstanding. Thank you, Mr. President. I wish him well and wish him all the best.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Katz.

Senator **KATZ**: Thank you Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I grew to know Terry Brann during my two years of service on the Appropriations Committee. I think all of us have met many skilled and dedicated people in state service, but, from my perspective, no one meets that category more than Terry does. As you've heard, I think we all have respect for his work ethics, for his even temper, for his quiet competence, and he is now, fortunately for us who live in this area, although we're losing him in state government, going to Maine General Health to help solve the problems of healthcare delivery. For those of you who don't deal with Terry on a regular basis, this is a real loss to state government. Nobody is irreplaceable, but he's about as close as it comes. We certainly wish him well and thank him not only for

his service to our state but also for his service in the National Guard. In conclusion, Mr. President, I'd say he's about my favorite Yankee fan in the whole world.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Hancock, Senator Langley.

Senator LANGLEY: Thank you Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, my story is a little bit different. I'd like to congratulate Terry for his new future in front of him. In the 125<sup>th</sup> Legislature I put in a bill, and it was passed and went through, to have the State of Maine do a recovery audit. For those of you who are not familiar with a recovery audit, that's where an outside auditing company comes in and audits all the transactions. financial transactions, of an organization or, in this case, the State of Maine, outside of payroll and outside of DHHS. I was like a dog on a bone on this bill, that was in the 125<sup>th</sup>. Every time I saw Terry I'd ask him where the progress was on the RFP, had it gone out, had a company come in yet, and where did we stand. I think I drove him out of state government and to take this new job. Two weeks ago I got the final report. This is a real testament to the work that Terry has done. This outside company only gets paid on the mistakes that it finds and the money that it recovers. After going through \$4 billion worth of transactions that the State of Maine has done, the average out in the business community is 1% to 2% mistakes, there was only \$20,000 worth of mistakes in transactions. I've got a list of those in case you're interested. That's a real testament to the work that's been done and a real testament to the work that Terry has done. That error rate is really penominal. We may disagree, I think, on where we might spend our dollars, but we certainly can rest assured that Terry made sure they got where they were supposed to go. Thank you, ladies and gentlemen.

Senator **HILL**: Thank you Mr. President. I rise and I concur with everything that was said by each of the good Senators here before me. I have to tell you, in Appropriations you really hope people will come before you that you can totally rely on and feel comfortable about and can ask them any kind of question you have to get to where you need to go. With Terry Brann I always felt that great sense of comfort. I will share with you, however, that he never gave me his cell phone number and I'm really disappointed about that. Nonetheless, I think I just want to sum it up by saying, as Senator Katz had said, he is a true, true loss to government.

I am pleased to submit, pursuant to 5 MRS A § 13056-A and 5 MRS A § 13107, the Comprehensive Evaluation of State Investments in Economic Development and the Comprehensive Evaluation of State Investments in Research and Development. The reports were compiled by Investment Consulting Associates (ICA) following the company's contract award which was the result of a competitive bidding process in accordance with state policy. Links to these reports can be found on the DECD Website at the following address: <a href="http://www.maine.gov/decd/reports-pubs">http://www.maine.gov/decd/reports-pubs</a>.

The biennial progress reports provide an assessment of the effectiveness of Maine's economic incentive programs and an analysis of the success of the state's investments in research and

development. The reports were generated after ICA developed and deployed a wide-ranging survey of recipients of Maine incentive programs and through in-person interviews with businesses and stakeholders. They also collected reports, data, and other information from stakeholders and state agencies when available and not prohibited due to statutory confidentiality provisions. The reports include numerous recommendations based upon the evaluation process and highlight opportunities for improvements going forward, as well as valuable insights into which programs provide a good return on investment based on ICA's cost-benefit analysis.

Additionally, in accordance with the contract, ICA is responsible for completing a one-time overall evaluation of the state's investments based on the results of the attached assessments. That report, due no later than June 30, 2014, will assess how effective the state's economic development strategies have been in stimulating and sustaining consistent, competitive growth in Maine's economy compared to other states nationally. Specifically, it will gauge which states have experienced the greatest growth in the last 5 years, determine the drivers of that growth, discover the economic programs that contributed to the growth, and evaluate how Maine compares. It will also ascertain whether or not the state is missing opportunities to provide incentives to some business sectors while potentially oversubsidizing others.

Officials from ICA will be available during the last week of February when we would like to formally present the information <u>collectively</u> to the Joint Standing Committees on Appropriations and Financial Affairs; Taxation; and Labor, Commerce, Research and Economic Development.

I welcome the opportunity to work with the appropriate Committee Clerks and Analysts to schedule a mutually beneficial time when we can present the findings and recommendations and answer any questions that you may have.
