RESOLUTION REGARDING THE GOVERNOR'S PROPOSED BUDGET By the Gardiner City Council on February 20, 2013

Whereas, the City of Gardiner stands to lose \$598,789 in municipal revenue sharing funds in the upcoming fiscal year if the state budget as proposed by Governor Paul LePage is adopted; and

Whereas, MSAD 11 would pay an additional \$300,000 to fund teacher retirement under the Governor's budget proposal, of which Gardiner property tax payers would be responsible for \$117,450 in the upcoming fiscal year; and

Whereas, 946 non-elderly Gardiner households would lose \$199 each, or \$188,254 total, in property tax relief in the upcoming fiscal year under the cuts to the Homestead Exemption program, if the Legislature adopts the Governor's proposed budget; and

Whereas, 292 non-elderly Gardiner households that currently qualify for the Circuit Breaker program would lose an average of \$344 each, or \$100,448 total in the upcoming fiscal year, under that program, if the Legislature adopts the Governor's proposed budget; and

Whereas, many Gardiner households would lose \$543 in tax offsets if they had previously qualified for both the Homestead Exemption and Circuit Breaker programs, if the Legislature adopts the Governor's proposed budget; and

Whereas, the City of Gardiner stands to lose \$27,727 with tractor trailer excise tax revenues being transferred from the City of Gardiner to the State of Maine, if the Legislature adopts the Governor's proposed budget; and

Whereas, our community will once again be forced either to eliminate classroom education and other programs in our schools or find local funds to compensate for the reduction in state financial support for public education; and

Whereas, this City Council will be faced with the unacceptable choice of either severely cutting essential municipal services or dramatically increasing the property tax burden on our fellow residents; and

Whereas, we, as the elected representatives of the residents and taxpayers of Gardiner, have an obligation to maintain essential local services, ensure a quality education for our children and contain the property tax burden of our citizens;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDINER THAT, we call upon the Governor and the members of 126th Legislature to fully fund municipal revenue sharing for the coming biennium, maintain the Circuit Breaker and Homestead Exemption property tax relief programs, and fulfill the state's K-12 education funding mandate under the School Finance Act of 2003 and confirmed by vote of the people of Maine in a June 2004 referendum.

Dear President Alfond and Speaker Eves:

Please be advised that the Waterville City Council recently unanimously approved the attached Resolution in opposition to the Governor's proposal to eliminate Municipal Revenue Sharing and to shift other costs, especially teacher retirement, to towns and cities.

Attached is a graphic display of the importance of the revenue sharing and the school subsidy programs in Waterville. Please note the increases in both programs and the concurrent decrease in our tax rate from 2005 to 2009. In addition to those increased revenues, budget cuts were made at the time that helped a mil rate reduction from 27.4 to 24.4 or 11%. Mayor LePage at the time fought for both programs in order to provide significant property tax relief to Waterville taxpayers.

As a result of revenue sharing reductions during the Baldacci administration, the City made additional budget reductions and began use of surplus to offset lost revenues. The severe revenue reductions that have occurred over the past 3-4 years, have left nothing left to trim on the city or school budgets without severe disruptions to programs and services - some of them essential.

As you can see on the attached graph, the decline in revenue sharing receipts from 2009 to today is about \$1.3M which equates to 2 mils in our property tax rate. Over the past 4 years, the city

has been able to blunt some of that impact on local property tax payers by resorting to our surplus. We can no longer go to that source for fear of falling below accepted levels of cash on hand.

In short, we believe that cuts as proposed by the Governor will directly lead to property tax increases in Waterville. We find it more than just ironic that when he was here he often reserved his harshest criticisms for those at the state level, including then Governor Baldacci, who advocated reductions in municipal assistance in order to help balance the state budget.

Please join with us in opposition to these unfair budget proposals.

TOWN OF WINTHROP RESOLUTION

Be It Resolved by the Winthrop Town Council:

Whereas, the Winthrop Town Council is deeply concerned and wishes to express its opposition to multiple proposals to shift the burden of funding state government to municipalities through the property tax and to the property tax payer.

Whereas, the State Administration has submitted a proposed budget for the coming biennium that will dramatically shift the burden of funding state government to the property tax by eliminating or significantly modifying multiple property tax relief programs:

Whereas, the proposal to suspend municipal revenue sharing would result in a loss of over \$1,000,000 in revenues over the next two years;

Whereas, the proposal to redirect the commercial excise tax and in the second year of the biennium, the business equipment tax reimbursement program would be eliminated which would further exacerbate the property tax burden;

Whereas, AOS 97 would be required to pay an additional \$114,000 to fund Teacher Retirement under the Governor's

budget proposal which would adversely affect the school budget and ultimately be reflected in the community's assessment;

Whereas, eliminating the homestead exemption in FY 15 for those under 65 will increase taxes for those individuals if the Town's tax rate remains the same:

Whereas, low and moderate income residents under the age of 65 who now qualify for the state property tax circuit breaker program will no longer qualify for it in the coming budget year. The lack of this particular program could lead directly to them losing their property to foreclosure;

Whereas, to replace these revenues through property taxation, the Town's tax rate would need to be increased by approximately \$1.00 on the property tax rate including the impact of AOS 97 assessment and before considering any needs of the community in its budget;

Whereas, these proposals would dramatically increase property taxes in Winthrop and all communities and also require large spending reductions that will challenge the Town's ability to protect the health, safety and welfare of the community through providing basic services.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Winthrop Town Council to express its opposition to the proposed state budget which significantly shifts the burden of funding state government to the property tax and property tax payer. Further, the Winthrop Town Council calls upon the members of the Legislature to fully fund municipal revenue sharing for the coming biennium, fulfill the State's K-12 Education Funding Mandate under the School Finance act of 2003, allow the towns to keep the commercial excise tax it collects, continue the BETE reimbursement to the communities for the property taxes no longer paid to the Towns for business equipment, and maintain the Circuit Breaker and Homestead Exemption property tax relief programs for our citizens.

We, the Wayne Board of Selectmen strongly oppose the Governor's Proposed State Budget. The Governor's Proposed State Budget dramatically shifts the burden of funding state government to the local property tax and property taxpayers.

The Governor's Proposed State Budget eliminates or significantly modifies long-standing property tax relief programs. If enacted, these changes will reduce Town revenues by at least \$109,923, excluding certain impacts on the school budget. This represents about a third of all non-property tax revenues. The Wayne Board of Selectmen and their constituents will be forced to make dramatic cuts to existing services or to replace these revenues through property taxation; the Town's tax rate would have to increase by \$0.62 cents per \$1,000 of valuation before considering any other expenditure increases that may be required or 4.5 percent increase in the tax rate.

For example, \$109,923 represents over 100% of all Wayne's town wages (excluding benefits). Further cuts in personnel would result in a dramatic loss in services to Wayne residents including state services providing by the Town such as vehicle registration, Inland Fisheries and Wildlife licenses and registrations, general assistance, dog licensing and vital records management. A loss of \$109,923 in state revenues exceeds the Town's paving budget (\$95,000) and all our fire, public safety, social service and non-profit program budgets (\$108,656).

Wayne is a small rural town already working with other communities to provide vital services. This including education services through RSU #38 with the Towns of Readfield, Manchester, and Mount Vernon; solid waste disposal with Town of Readfield; roadside mowing and calcium chloride treatment to gravel roads with the Town of Readfield; ambulance services from Winthrop; traffic control from Kennebec County Sheriff's Office; animal shelter from the Kennebec Valley Humane Society; contracted code enforcement and assessing services is shared with a number of municipalities; highway maintenance services are outsourced to private contractors; our town office is rented from RSU #38; and emergency 911 dispatching from the state.

The Wayne Board of Selectmen hereby expresses its strong opposition to the Governor's Proposed State Budget, which would significantly shift the burden of funding state government to the property tax and property tax payer. These proposals will dramatically increase property taxes in Wayne, taxes which often are unrelated to the ability of property owners to pay, and will require spending reductions which will call into question our ability to protect the health and welfare of our community and provide our residents with basic government services.
