Dear Speaker Eves:

As members of the Town of Arrowsic Select Board, we are concerned over the direction of the State budget and economic plans as laid out in the recently proposed biennial budget. Like many small towns in Maine, Arrowsic has one primary source of revenue - property taxes - that are assessed without regard to a person's income and therefore unrelated to his or her ability to pay taxes. Property taxes are the only revenue we can raise to provide the basic services - schooling, roads, garbage collection, emergency response - that our citizens need.

The State of Maine, on the other hand, has the power to establish a fairer tax system that takes personal and corporate income into account and that distributes the burden across wealthier and poorer towns. We have a joint responsibility to the citizens of Maine to create a State-Municipal mix of revenues and spending on services that serve our common goals and interests.

For this reason, we urge you to work with the State legislature to craft a biennial budget that fully funds the State's obligations to municipalities in terms of revenue sharing, General Assistance, and the 55% contribution to local schools that was passed by referendum. We ask that you refrain from expanding property tax exemptions, an action which reduces the Town's tax base and which exacerbates inequities in the property tax burden.

In order to do this, we recognize that the State will need to raise revenues. However, the State has the authority and instruments to do this in an equitable fashion that avoids the harsh impact that would otherwise result from shifting the burden so massively to property taxes.

URGING THE MAINE STATE LEGISLATURE TO CRAFT A
BIENNIAL STATE BUDGET THAT PREVENTS A SIGNIFICANT
INCREASE IN PROPERTY TAXES

BE IT RESOLVED by the Selectmen of the Town of Benton, acting as the municipal officers as follows:

WHEREAS, the Governor's proposed biennial budget includes the suspension of municipal revenue sharing and other revenue sources that would result in an estimated \$200,000.00 or more in lost revenue to the Town of Benton; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget includes the elimination of the \$10,000 Homestead Exemption for those under 65 years of age; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget includes changes to the Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement Program and the shifting of some commercial excise taxes from Municipalities to the State; and

WHEREAS, these proposed changes in state policy would shift a significant financial burden onto property taxpayers, which would result in an estimated \$200.00 increase in property taxes for the average Benton household owned by persons under 65 years of age with a property assessed at \$100,000.00, without corresponding cuts that would have a far-reaching and detrimental impact on essential municipal services; and

WHEREAS, the property tax implications referenced above do not include the additional tax levy from the School District as a result of the proposed biennial budget;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

THAT the Selectmen of Benton, Maine hereby urge the Maine State Legislature to craft a biennial budget compromise that considers the already high property tax burden, seeks balance, progressivity, and a comprehensive approach with respect to tax policy, and identifies alternative cost savings and tax reforms that would prevent a significant increase in property taxes and protect essential municipal services from detrimental cuts.

The M.S.A.D. #49 Board of School Directors, representing the towns of Albion, Benton, Clinton and Fairfield, has asked that I forward the enclosed resolution to you. The Board adopted this resolution at our meeting on March 7, 2013. We are all concerned that a permanent shift of responsibility for teacher retirement from the state to local districts will have a detrimental effect. The retirement payments must be paid at the expense of

other urgent operating costs, if necessary. The shift of net cost is not merely an accounting exercise but a structural transfer of funding responsibility. Any state subsidy directed at retirement in the current proposal would create the false impression that the state is increasing its percentage of support required by LD #1. Unfortunately, the opposite would be the clear effect.

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR:
URGING THE MAINE STATE LEGISLATURE TO CRAFT A
BIENNIAL STATE BUDGET THAT PREVENTS A SIGNIFICANT
INCREASE IN PROPERTY TAXES.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of Maine School Administrative District #49, as follows:

WHEREAS, the Governor's proposed biennial budget includes shifting more than \$28 million in retirement costs onto school districts--a cost shift the state says it will partially subsidize for now, but for which there are no guarantees for the future; and

WHEREAS, under the Maine Constitution the sole responsibility and authority for public education is given to the Maine Legislature; and

WHEREAS, more than 60 years ago, the Maine Legislature established the Maine State Retirement System, mandating that all teachers be included in the retirement system; and

WHEREAS, the teacher retirement system is a defined benefit plan where retirement benefits are determined based on earnings and years of service; and

WHEREAS, the state is proposing shifting \$28 million of the state retirement obligation to local school systems to be funded by property taxes; and

WHEREAS, the relative property wealth of individual school districts varies widely from district to district, which directly affects the amount of money which a local school district can raise for the support of education; and

WHEREAS, the state is proposing funding only 50% and not the 55% as mandated by the school funding formula.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED.

THAT the Board of Directors of School Administrative District #49, hereby urges the Maine State Legislature to craft a biennial budget compromise that considers the already high property tax

burden, and which does not add to this burden by transferring the Legislature's fiduciary responsibility for teacher retirement to local school districts, and further that the state continue to fully fund teacher retirement now and in the future.
